

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Our friend George MacDonald of Boston, Mass., is always on the lookout for an item of horse news of interest and has called our attention to the latest performance of Mary S. Budlong at Foxboro where she won her last four starts at Foxboro and in every case has reduced her record. But what George has particularly brought to our notice is that her dam is Betty S. 2:07 by Wallace McKinney. He writes: "She looks like she will develop into a real high-class pacer." Bred the way she is there is no reason why George's prediction will not be fulfilled because her dam, Betty S., was one of the great race mares that was brought to the Maritimes. The same night the four-year-old pacer Mr. McGee won the 2:24 pace in 1:15 which is a new record for the son of Abner T. Clegg 2:04 1/2.

During Betty's career in Ohio she was very highly regarded and took a record of 2:07 and was bought by Alexander & Lawson, Lock Lomand, N.S. Her first start in the Maritimes was made June 27th, 1934, at Truro, where she was 1-1-1, King Spruce 4-2-2, seven other starters, best time 2:12 1/2. At North Sydney July 11th, she won the 2:17 class in straight heats. I'm Alone 2-2-4, King Spruce 5-4-2, two other starters, best time 2:10 1/2. At Northam, P. E. I., she won a 2:14 class in straight heats. Patrick Direct 2-2-2, Lucky Lindy 6-3-3, three other starters, best time 2:09 1/2. At New Annan on August 2nd, the 2:12 class—Betty S. 3-1-1, King Spruce 1-3-3, Marjorie M. 2-2-2, three other starters, time, 2:10, 2:10 1/2, 2:11 1/2. At Montague, August 8th, in the 2:12 Trot and Pace, Patrick Direct won the first heat in 2:07 1/2, which is still the track pacing record there. Betty S. won the next heat in 2:09 1/2, and Patrick Direct the third heat and race in 2:09.

At Charlottetown Exhibition August 25th, Betty S. won the 2:12 Pace with 1-1-1, Marjorie M. 3-2-2, Patrick Direct 2-3-5, four other starters, time, 2:09, 2:10 1/2, 2:10. She also won the 2:16 class the following day in straight heats. King Spruce 2-2-4, time, 2:09, 2:10, 2:12. At Halifax, she won the 2:13 class with 2-1-1, Heartherbell 1-3-4, best time, 2:09, and in the 2:16 class the following day Star G. won the first heat in 2:11 1/2, the next was a dead heat with Star G. in 2:10 1/2, and Star G. won the third heat and race in 2:11 1/2. He was owned by Alderman Harry Breen.

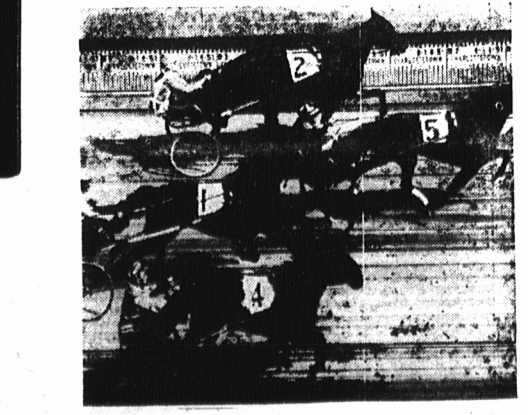
Many will remember her start at Charlottetown on August 20th, 1935, in the 2:12 Trot and Pace—Betty S., 1-1-1, Marjorie M. 2-2-3, Heartherbell 3-3-2, Catherine C. 4-4-4, Morning Express, Dis. Tim. 2:09, 2:10 1/2, 2:09. She also won three races at Sydney and at Montague, where Star G. won the first heat in 2:11 and Betty S. the next two in 2:09 and 2:12 1/2. At Fredericton she was 2-1-1, Calumet Devil 1-2-2, time, 2:08 1/2, 2:07 1/2, 2:09 1/2. The above is only a partial glance at Betty S.'s wonderful racing career but it shows she had indomitable courage, endurance and speed and we hope that Mary S. Budlong will go on to take an equally fast record.

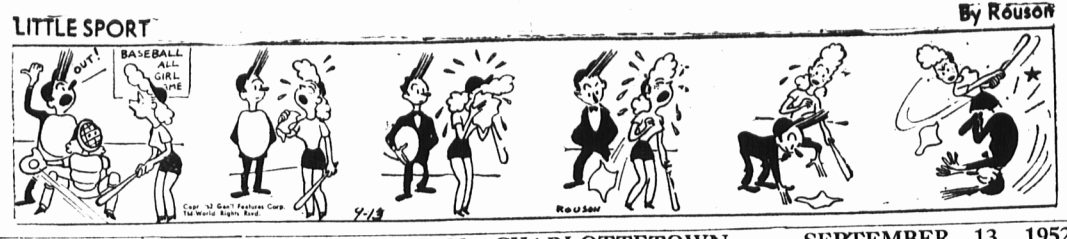

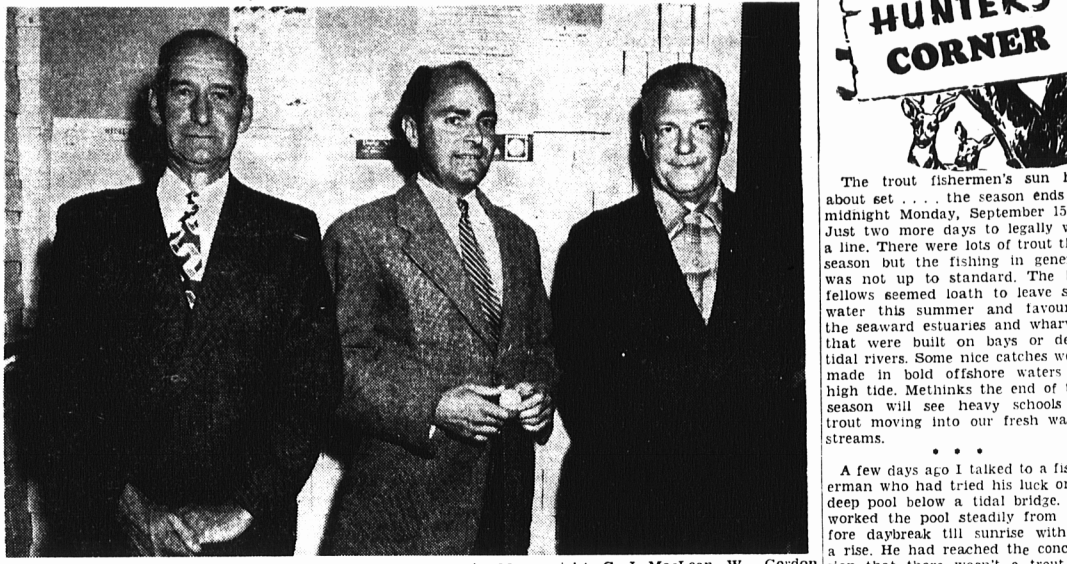

FISH And GAME

The Queen's County Branch of the P. E. I. Fish and Game Protection Association will hold a meeting at the Recreation Hall, Cavendish on Wednesday, September 17 at 8:00 p.m.

The special speaker will be Mr. Wilfred Saunders, Wild Life Biologist of The Fisheries Research Board, who will describe his work on trout rearing experiments.

Three short, but extremely interesting films on fishing and hunting will also be shown.

HUNTERS' CORNER

The trout fishermen's sun has about set... the season ends at midnight Monday, September 15th. Just two more days to legally wet a line. There were lots of trout this season but the fishing in general was not up to standard. The big fellows seemed loath to leave salt water this summer and favoured the seaward estuaries and wharves that were built on bays or deep tidal rivers. Some nice catches were made in bold offshore waters at high tide. Methinks the end of the season will see heavy schools of trout moving into our fresh water streams.

A few days ago I talked to a fisherman who had tried his luck on a deep pool below a tidal bridge. He worked the pool steadily from before daybreak till sunrise without a rise. He had reached the conclusion that there wasn't a trout in the pool until the rising sun shone on the water at a certain angle. The light was reflected on a corner of the pool and he could see clear to the bottom. In this small section he counted approximately twenty large trout, several in the three pound bracket. A lot of fishermen have told me the same story... dozens of big 'uns but nary a nibble.

Yankees And Indians Win; Brooklyn Increase Lead To Four Games

New York Yankees clung to their half-game in the torrid American League pennant race by defeating Chicago White Sox 6-4 Friday night while Cleveland Indians blanked Boston Red Sox 5-0.

In the National League, Brooklyn's front-running Dodgers widened their margin over New York Giants to four games by thumping St. Louis Cardinals 8-5. The Giants split a doubleheader with Cincinnati Reds, winning the first game 4-2 but dropping the second 8-7.

Little Billy Martin homered and tripled across three runs in the Yankees' victory. Martin's fourth and got the victory, and Lanky Ewell Blackwell, who hurled the final three.

Cleveland's Early Wynn shut out the Red Sox on three hits as the Indians won their ninth straight game. It was Wynn's 21st victory and the fifth during his current streak. The Tribe collected 13 hits off older Sid Hudson and Al Benton.

Wynn helped his own cause by belting two singles which figured in the Cleveland scoring. In the fifth, after Ray Boone singled, the pitcher singled him to second. Boone then scored when Dale Mitchell's grounder forced Wynn. Wynn also drove Jim Hegan home with the last Cleveland run in the eighth.

Andy Pafko drove home five runs on a pair of homers and a single to spark the Dodgers to their victory.

Durable Joe Black, making his 50th appearance of the season, gained credit for his 14th victory against three defeats. He had only one bad inning, the eighth, when Stan Musial and Hal Rice homered to put the Cards back in the game.

The Dodgers started fast, chasing starter Gerry Staley in the first inning in which they tallied four runs. Black took over from Preacher Roe, who also was hit freely until replaced in the fourth inning.

Cincinnati Reds threw a monkey wrench into New York Giants' pennant hopes Friday, grabbing the second game of a doubleheader 8-7 after the Giants won their fifth straight game in the opener, 4-2.

The split left the giants 3 1-2 games behind Brooklyn Dodgers, National League leaders, who were playing a night game against St. Louis Cardinals.

Cuba Wins Tuna Tourney

WEDGEPORT, N. S., Sept. 12—(CP)—With biggest and the most fish, Cuba today won the ninth International Tuna Tournament—a tournament that will go down on the records for exciting climax and discovery of a new and well stocked fishing ground.
