NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market made a small gain Monday, breaking a string of four straight daily declines. Trading was the slowest in more than a month.

Volume was 5,600,000 shares compared with 7,490,000 Friday. The Dow Jones industrial average rose 1.21 to 930.85.

Te market was mixed most of the session. Some prices improved in the final hour.

Airlines and motors were higher all day, steel posted gains of fractions to a point or so mostly.

SGM Corp. was the most active stock, rising 3/4 to 45 on 186,000 shares.

Chrysler gained 1/4, Ford 3/4 and General Motors 1/4.

Among Canadian issues, Dome Mines gained 1/4, Walker Godehard 3/4, Canadian Pacific 3/4, Hudson Bay Mining lost 1/2, International Nickel 3/4, McIntyre Porcupine 3/4.

Prices were generally higher on the American exchange. Volume was 1,970,000 shares compared with 2,310,000 Friday.

Among Canadian issues, Canadian Javelin and Preston gained 1/4, Jupiter Corp. 3/4, Scurry Rainbow Oil lost 3/4.

TORONTO

TORONTO (CP)—Banff Oil was the outstanding issue on the Toronto Stock Exchange Monday in a session noticeably short of highlights.

Banff, the most active and volatile stock on the board, closed the day with a 96-cent gain at 8.15 on 206,586 shares.

It traded as high as 8.50 and as low as 7.25.

The activity in the stock began Friday after Resources Minister Arthur Laing said an area 400 miles north of Edmonton, known as Rainbow Lake, may be the largest oil field in North America.

Investors immediately tied his remarks to Banff which is working in the area. Company officials said the statement on the size of the field were not justified, but the stock continued to climb anyway.

Enthusiasm for oils spread into other issues. Pacific Petroleum was up 1/4 to 1 1/2 and Scurry Rainbow 3/4 to 1 1/2.

PATINO ADVANCES. Patino advanced 45 cents to 9.40 in base metals after a report that the company was involved in a group which discovered some copper showing in Gaspe Provincial Park, 300 miles northeast of Quebec City.

East Sullivan gained 40 cents to 8.50. It has a property adjacent to the one in which Patino is interested.

Industrials made small gains as some buying came into the section late in the day. Bank of Nova Scotia was ahead 1/4 to 74 1/2.

On index, industrials were up 1.42 to 167.18, golds were down 1.44 to 156.41, base metals were up 1.44 to 80.75, western oils 1.14 to 101.40 and to TSE index 1.17 to 157.13. Volume was 2,640,000 shares compared with 3,622,000 Friday.

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MANITOBA POOL ELEVATORS TO OPERATE PACKING PLANT

BRANDON, Man. (CP)—He said two importers from Manitoba Pool Elevators has moved into the meat-packing industry.

"The trend the world over is for farmers to get into meat segments of off-farm business," said F. W. Hamilton, executive assistant of Manitoba Pool Elevators.

He also expects to export of fat-beasts, livers, kidneys and the like—to European countries, mainly through a sales office in London.

The plant will be operated by Pool Packers Ltd., a wholly-owned subsidiary of Manitoba Pool Elevators.

It consists of 67,000 square feet for storage and offices. The farmer-owned elevator company has just completed a \$3,500,000 meat-packing plant near Brandon that can process 35 cattle and 300 hogs an hour.

It will employ 125 to 150 men. The main market will be originally planned, due mainly to Winnipeg and rural Manitoba, but pool officials are optimistic about establishing markets in the United States and Europe.

The company is also aiming at markets in the British West Indies, United Kingdom, South America and Japan.

Mr. Hamilton said optimism for these markets is based on the increasing prosperity of these areas, which is usually reflected in increased per capita consumption of meat, and a rapidly-expanding population.

Paper Company Buys Interest In Dutch Firm

VANCOUVER (CP)—MacMillan, Bloedel and Powell River Ltd., Canada's largest forest products company, announced Monday plans for a move into the European Common Market by purchase of a substantial interest in a Dutch firm which manufactures fine paper.

The announcement by J. V. Clyne, chairman and chief executive, said the company will invest \$15,000,000 in Koninklijke Nederlandsche Papierfabriek.

The Dutch firm, founded in 1850, has six paper machines at its mill in Maastricht and is a leading supplier of coated and uncoated printing, writing and specialist papers for the Common Market countries.

Purchase of the share equity in KNP will be recommended by the board of directors of KNP to its shareholders. Management of KNP would remain the same but two MBPR nominees would be appointed to the KNP board.
