## 500 At Alberton See Longliners Engineered

ALBERTON—More than 500 persons yesterday attended the christening and blessing at Alberton of the two longliners constructed by Alberton Industries Limited for service among Canada's Eskimo fishermen in the north.

Premier Walter R. Shaw and five members of his cabinet attended the ceremonies, which were conducted at the Alberton wharf in sunny weather.

The 46-foot "Gjalaguag" was christened by Mrs. W. A. MacNaught, wife of the collector-general of Canada, and the 49-foot "Nassau" was christened by Mrs. Leo Rossier, wife of the provincial minister of fisheries.

Both ships, built for the department of northern affairs, will be used by the Eskimos in commercial fishing in the Hudson Bay area.

Cyril R. Laird, secretary of the Alberton and Prince County Board of Trade, acted as master-of-ceremonies and extended a warm welcome to all those in attendance.

Mayor M. Roy Laird, extended a welcome on behalf of the Town of Alberton. "During their brief time in Alberton, the crews of the two vessels will provide many friends who wish them a successful voyage," the mayor said.

floor but only a complete investigation would give the actual cause.

As the fire department arrived, the east section comprised of the two lower floors was completely ablaze. The fire broke out when Mrs. White lived beside to blaze as uncontrolled flames swept the building. The roof above Mrs. White's quarters was burned away.

After banging on doors to provide firemen with the second floor in getting to the top of the building, the fire department was forced to jump as well as the fire broke out when Mrs. White threw his shoes from the window and then jumped himself.

Firemen were able to leave the scene at six o'clock but that remained of the building was a scorched and broken shell.

**BURNING SOME TIME**

Inspector Rananah estimated that the fire had been burning for some time before it actually burst out. "It must have broken out all sections simultaneously," he said. "There wasn't much the fire department could do."

Other occupants of the building were Abraham Doyle and his daughter, and Mrs. Martin. Daniel Gillis and his son, Donald, George MacDonald, Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Braden, and William Parkman. It is not known how many of these people were in it at the time of the blaze.

Mr. and Mrs. James Flanagan and family, who live on the first floor were out of the province at the time but have since returned.

Another description of the outbreak came from a girl who said she and others put a lighted glow in the back yard that resembled a bon fire. By the time they reached the rear of the building, flames were covering the entire side.

Dr. L. E. Prowse, coroner, said there will be no inquest into the death.

Mrs. White is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Vincent Grennan, Lord William, Ont., and a son, William Parkman, who lived with her. Her husband died last year.
