

DRIVER CONTEMPTUOUS

License Suspension Time Given Increase

SUMMERSIDE — Reckless driving caused Summerside streets to young local man Michael Gay, his driver's license for a three month period as well as a \$10 fine when he appeared in police court yesterday before Magistrate R. S. Hinton QC.

The original sentence was for a six week cancellation of license and the fine but after accused made a couple of contemptuous remarks the Magistrate liked to three months.

James MacDougall, a Summerside businessman appeared as a witness against Gay and told the court how the car, a 1958 Plymouth the accused was driving last Saturday afternoon on Water St., east, was zigzagging in and out of traffic with tires screeching.

Mr. MacDougall said he followed the car and it later stopped on Harvard street where during conversation with the accused he threatened to beat him up. After notifying the police he attempted to learn the identity of the trio, he testified, during which the car returned and "one fellow wanted to hit me" Mr. MacDougall stated but he was restrained by the others.

Mr. MacDougall said, "if these boys were taken to hospital and saw some of the people lying there as a result of accidents, it might have the desired effect."

Gay, in his defence, said Mr. MacDougall had twisted the arm of one of the youths with him. He said he took the car home after the first meeting with Mr. MacDougall and one of his brothers took it. He estimated his speed at 30 m.p.h. when he passed the MacDougall car on Water Street east. He told the court he paid \$30 for the vehicle after being quoted by the magistrate.

Police Chief Peter White stated the attitude of this boy toward law enforcement is alarming. He stated there was also a complaint against Gay from another man at the same time Mr. MacDougall notified the police of the incident.

Magistrate Hinton said "it is right to drive in a privilege. It's time we made an example of the someone and you see him to just the guy. It's time you learned a lesson."

Charges Withdrawn Against Two Accused In Liquor Case

SUMMERSIDE — Charges of having possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their respective residences were withdrawn against two accused who appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court yesterday.

The charges were dropped when a third man, who was in the car containing the liquor, claimed ownership of the liquor, thus clearing the other two accused.

Four other persons pleaded guilty to separate charges of possession of intoxicating liquor in a place other than their residences, had earlier pleaded not guilty, and his case was heard yesterday.

C.E.F. McCue, Summerside detachment RCMP one of the arresting officers, testified. The accused was found guilty and fined \$20 and costs.

An accused was fined \$5 and costs for failing to stop at a stop sign, and another accused was given a reprimand for failing to transfer the registration of a motor vehicle in his name.

David Joseph Gallant, Summerside, was fined \$10 and costs for failing to transfer the registration of a motor vehicle to his name. In passing the fine, Magistrate MacDonald stated that Gallant had sufficient time to register the vehicle.

Gordon Edward Matheson, Altonville, charged with speeding, was absent, and his case proceeded ex parte. Col. N. Currie, the RCMP arresting officer, presented evidence, and Matheson was convicted as charged, and given a fine of \$10 and costs.

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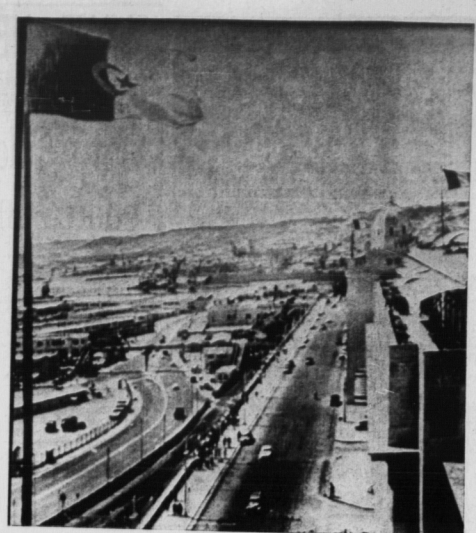

Sparkling New Fire Hall Officially Opened In S' side

SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN — Summerside's sparkling new fire hall was officially opened last night as Claude T. Kenney, Esq., suspended the traditional white ribbon Mr. Kenney, 54, has been associated with the fire department for the past 40 years.

Summerside Mayor J. Ernest Forrester officially welcomed guests to the new hall, and spoke briefly. "The town is growing," he said, "and as the years enlarge, so must the services be increased. The new

fire hall will be a great asset in the fighting. Twelve years ago the town bought its first pumper, and several pieces of equipment have been added repeatedly since that time."

Mayor Morrison stated that the town had "made a substantial saving" by constructing the fire hall under the winter works program.

Mr. Kenney, the architect who designed the building, presented provincial minister of agriculture, Andrew B. MacRae with the towel to lay the cornerstone. Mr. MacRae let out Premier Walter Shaw's behalf, who is in Labrador.

In laying the cornerstone, Mr. MacRae stated that this was the first time he had laid a cornerstone, "and it has to be for someone else" he quipped.

"The citizens of this town are to be congratulated," asserted the minister of agriculture, who also commented on the winter works program construction, and said he was "pleased to see so many towns and communities taking advantage of this valuable program."

"The cornerstone which 'sets the base' was how Halifax Fire Chief Fred MacCallivan described his views on the new building. "Fire services today are recognized as an important part of our community," he said, "and I am proud to see a man recognized as a professional in this way, not only as far as fire fighting is concerned, but in emergency measures too."

CO-OPERATION STRESSED — Mr. MacCallivan complimented all Summerside citizens on their splendid efforts, and stated "the success of this building depends upon the co-operation which the fire department receives from private citizens."

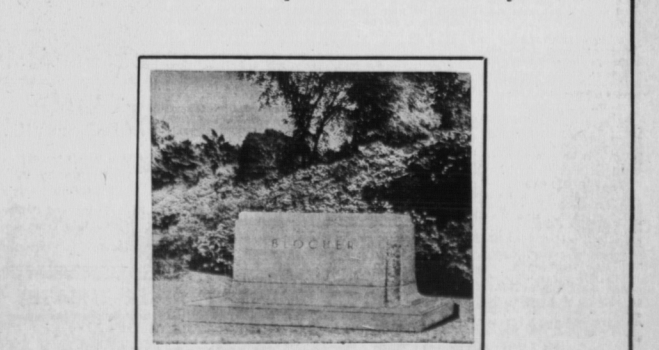
