The experts looked good last night on the Bobo Olsen-Randy Turpin fight. They picked Olsen as a 3-1 favorite to win and he enjoyed just about that much of an edge in the ring. Olson, who over-shadowed by more colorful, hard-hitting punchers in the past, certainly appeared to be a worthy champion as he pummeled the game Englishman. Turpin proved himself a courageous battler but hardly the same fighter that he was when he fought Sugar Robinson a couple of years back. ### To Decide Later On Trophy For MMHL Competition

KEMPTVILLE, Ont. (CP)—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association will decide later this season what trophy the Maritime Major Hockey League teams will play for. W.B. (Baldy) George, CAHA president, said Wednesday.

But whatever that decision is, the Maritime Major clubs won't play for the Allan Cup if they have any professional players on their teams, he said. George was commenting on a statement in Glace Bay, N.S., by C. Roy MacDonald, president of the maritime league, that the league will insist on playing off with the Allan Cup winner if the Alexander Trophy is taken out of circulation.

George said no formal motion has been made by the CAHA to withdraw the Alexander Trophy, presented in 1949 by Field Marshal Lord Alexander for competition among major series clubs which were allowed to carry professional players. The Allan Cup was to remain the championship emblem of senior leagues unconnected with the major clubs.

George said that since the other major leagues—the Western Canada, Ontario Hockey Association and Quebec Senior—are no longer in the running for the Alexander Cup, there aren't enough competitors for the trophy.

### THE LOG OF HMCS SIOUX

Two Tours of Duty in Korean Waters

Built in the United Kingdom, the 2500-ton HMCS Sioux was commissioned in the Royal Canadian Navy on February 21, 1944.

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In 1950, at Esquimalt, B.C., was modernized into an anti-submarine destroyer, and equipped with missile and acoustic submarine detection arrangements unique in British and Canadian destroyer armaments.

Ten days after the invasion of South Korea—on July 5, 1950—HMCS Sioux was one of the first three R.C.N. destroyers to sail to the Far East. Completed her first Korean tour in February, 1951, returned three months later for second tour of duty with the United Nations fleet.

During her two tours, took part in the Inchon invasion... in patrol many heavy bombardments on enemy positions... in destruction of enemy mines and blockade duties... destruction of enemy mines.

Returning to Canada from her second Korean tour in April, 1952, HMCS Sioux was employed for the balance of the year as representing Canada in the Coronation Naval Review at Spithead.

This last summer the Sioux was part of the six-ship force representing Canada in the Coronation Naval Review at Spithead.

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
