A Broken Party.

The Grit party in Canada has literally gone to wreck and ruin. Its unCanadian and unBritish policy forced its ablest and best man to withdraw from it previous to the last election. Almost every politician of ability belonging to it is either dead or gone over to the Conservatives.

Crops and Prospects.

The Defeat of Blaine.

The great event of the Convention is less the nomination of the President than the final defeat of Mr. Blaine. At the same moment he loses his chance for the Presidency and his public career ends. Eight years ago he was nominated amid immense acclamation, but also immense doubt. The next morning a breach in the party began, and it deepened and widened until he was defeated at the polls. It was a peculiar defeat, because it was personal and not political; that is to say, it was determined not by a change of political views upon the part of the Republican dissidents, but by a conviction that he had practically abused official opportunities. A nomination and an election eight years later he might have regarded as a reversal of that verdict. But now he will appear in our history as the man who broke the line of successful Republican candidates for the Presidency which began with Abraham Lincoln and was resumed after Blaine's defeat.

Orme, the Duke of Westminster's great colt, prevented by a mishap from running in the Derby, won his first race on Friday last. It was the Eclipse Stakes at Sandown park, worth \$50,000.
