Burglars Fail In Attempt To Enter Canteen

"The White Spot" a small canteen at the west end of the town of Summerside received the attention of the underworld on Monday night in an attempted break which was one more in a series of breaks into various canteens and other small places of business in the town, some of the breaks being successful, others unproductive.

Police are using every effort to check on and protect these small places of business and before reporting in to make up his report for police blotter on Monday night, Constable Ralph Hardy had visited "The White Spot" and found that everything was in order. Within a matter of twenty minutes, after making his report, he re-checked the canteen and found that the unsuccessful attempt had been made to force entrance. Apparently the criminals have no respect, even for places of worship, and it was learned yesterday that during last week they had entered St. Paul's Church and stole the money box from the vigil light stand and departed hence, taking with them a fire extinguisher. The copper rainpots on the church promised an easy source of income and a portion of these were taken away at some time during the week.

Accept Tender For New Floor In Civic Stadium

A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening accepted the tender of M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., in the amount of \$12,300.00 for the laying of a concrete floor on the ice surface of the Civic Stadium. Under the contract the work will be supervised by an inspector appointed by the town, and the project must be completed not later than July 4th.

West Prince Fish, Game Ass'n Meets

The first meeting of the West Prince branch of the P.E.I. Fish and Game Association since their organization in May was held in the Alberton Legion Hall last night with the president, J. Ivan Nicholson presiding. The president gave a comprehensive report on a meeting of the provincial executive which he attended in Charlottetown recently, including considerable information of the pheasant program. It was decided to sponsor a crow shooting contest and Joseph MacDonald, Edward Millman and Marne Kennedy were appointed members of a committee to draw up the rules and regulations. Following a discussion on the scarcity of furs in Western Prince County the meeting adjourned. The next meeting will be held in O'Leary.

Fisheries Cases Heard At S'side

Eleven prosecutions were conducted by officers of the Fisheries Department at Summerside during the past month.

Four fishermen from Darnley, charged with possession of undersized lobsters, were convicted and fined from \$10 to \$35 and costs. A Darnley man charged with possession of "Berried" lobsters was fined \$4 and costs.

A Conway man, and one from MacNeill's Mills, were fined \$5 and \$10 respectively, for possession of undersized lobsters.

A man from Belmont Lot 16, charged with possession of undersized lobsters was fined \$32 and costs. A man from Central Lot 16, was fined \$100.00 and costs for obstructing a fisheries officer, and a man from Grand River, charged with a similar offence was fined \$50.00 and costs.

The above prosecutions were all conducted by Norman MacLeod, Fisheries officer, Department of Fisheries, Summerside, and were heard in County Magistrate's Court before Magistrate R. S. Hinton.

One other case, conducted by fisheries officer, L.S. Murphy, of Summerside, involved the possession of undersized lobsters in possession of a Morell man at Borden, for which he was fined \$40 and costs.

Let's Talk It Over

Those closing exercises in our local schools when the students of grade XII get their diplomas and certificates, signifying the completion of High School endeavours, are sometimes called "Commencement Exercises," which is the direct opposite, in a sense, of "closing. The idea, of course, is that they are standing at the threshold of their careers. It is true, some of them are about to be launched into the industrial and business worlds, but for others, particularly those aspiring to the professions, there is still a considerable period of training.

These closing exercises might well be called "the parting of the ways," up to Grade XII, with the exception of a small element of selection, the students have followed a common highway of knowledge. A lot of them must choose then what their vocations in life are to be. It is a momentous decision, and a wise choice, based on factors of health, special scholastic aptitudes, in fact, all that goes to make up personality, is essential. Unfortunately many people simply drift into their life work. Chance, rather than choice, decides what their future careers will be. Vocational guidance is looming larger and larger as a very important factor in High School procedure. It tends to keep square pegs out of round holes, and thus contributes both to the individual's happiness and the nation's efficiency.

STATE HEALTH

(Continued from page 1) may well be that, at this important convention, the pharmacists of the Maritime Provinces will wish to discuss the proposal and to record the views of an important segment of the drug profession.

One of the interesting things to note is that discussions of health insurance, ranging back over a generation in Canada, have, with very few exceptions, accepted and approved the principle that health insurance is basically a matter for implementation and administration at the provincial level.

TO FEDERAL The reports of the Rowell-Sirois Commission, the Marsh Report, the Green Book Proposals of 1945 may in one case or another have advocated transfer of responsibility for old age insurance or some of the other social insurance programs to the federal government; but in all of these reports, and in all other reports and studies carried out by either federal or provincial governments in Canada, there has been unanimous agreement and, in fact, insistence that health insurance, whatever the ultimate disposition of the other insurance programs, remain with the provincial governments.

Each province must decide for itself, in the light of its own position and resources, whether it wants health insurance or not. If only two or three provinces want health insurance and are prepared to do something about it, then obviously, this cannot be regarded as a matter involving the interest of the nation as a whole, and consequently justifying help from the federal government. It would be difficult to argue that all the people of Canada should be taxed to assist the people of only two or three provinces in meeting the costs of their health care.

On the other hand, if a majority of the provinces, representing a majority of the people of Canada, were to indicate their desire to go ahead with health insurance or some agreed phases of it,

there would be fairly general agreement, I should think, that the national, rather than a purely provincial, local or sectional interest, is involved, and that the federal authority would have some responsibility to assist the provinces, within prudent and reasonable limits, in achieving the objectives which they have set for themselves...

COST The estimated cost for 1956 of a nation-wide program embracing these two services totals \$365,000,000. The federal Government has offered to assume fifty per cent of this cost, or \$182,500,000 if all provinces agree to participate. The interesting point, however, from the standpoint of the Maritime Provinces is the manner in which the federal contribution to the program is to be distributed among the provinces.

Estimated per capita costs of a hospital care and diagnostic services' program vary all the way from \$12.22 in Newfoundland to \$28.84 in British Columbia, with the national average working out to \$22.84. Obviously, a simple 50-50 sharing with each province would be unfair since the Federal Government would be granting British Columbia \$14.26 per capita, while Newfoundland would receive only \$6.11 for each person in its population.

An alternative approach might base the federal contribution on one-half of the national average per capita costs. This division would receive over 90 per cent of its own cost while British Columbia would receive only 40 per cent.

As a result, a formula was developed which recognized the strengths and weakness of each of these alternatives by basing the federal contribution on both factors. In other words, the Federal Government will pay to each province grants equal to a portion of the shareable costs and amounting to: 25 per cent of the average per capita costs for Canada as a whole, plus 25 per cent of the average per capita costs in the province itself, multiplied by the population covered.

This means, in effect, that while British Columbia will only receive 45 per cent of its average per capita costs and Ontario 49 per cent, Newfoundland will receive 72 per cent and Prince Edward Island 65 per cent. The percentage contribution by the Federal Government in terms of provincial per capita costs, for Nova Scotia and New Brunswick will be 57 and 59 per cent respectively. It will, I think, be evident from what I have said that the implementation of a hospital insurance plan will not necessarily result in any large increase in expenditures. It will simply mean that the money will be spent through different channels.

Canadians Miss Good Thing By Ignoring Fish

WINDSOR, Ont. (CP) — Canadians are missing something because they are not eating more fish and fish products, Fisheries Minister Sinclair, said here Monday. He was visiting R. P. Scherer, Ltd., fish liver oil refiners.

Mr. Sinclair said fish liver, which used to be tossed over-

board, now are considered a vital source of energy. The fishermen, not the industry as a whole, benefited directly from the large amounts of fish livers purchased. The Canadian fishing industry's greatest need was for more consumers. The 1955 halibut catch was the greatest of all time, yet Canadians were far behind some nations in fish consumption.
