

Saints Nip Montague 10-9 To Take Lead In Series

Ed MacDonald fired a goal after 1 minutes and 59 seconds of sudden-death overtime to give S.D.U. a 10-9 victory over Montague Primroses in the third game of their semi-final series at the Sports Arena last night before a crowd of nearly 1,500 and gives S.D.U. a 2-1 lead in the series.

What was easily the most exciting game of the year was forced into overtime by Montague's captain Billy Hughes who scored a goal with only 1 second left in the game. In the 10-minute overtime period that followed Montague and the Saints spaced goals only 25 seconds apart to force the game into sudden-death overtime to set the stage for MacDonald's unassisted marker from in front of the net.

Montague were fighting an uphill battle all the way. S.D.U. potted the first two goals of the game in the first period but Montague made it 2-1 before the period ended. In the second the Saints shot three straight goals to build up a big 5-1 lead but the fighting Primroses out-scored the Saints 3-1 in the remaining minutes of the period to go into the third trailing 6-4.

But the Saints took over again in the third and led before six minutes had elapsed. At that point in the game and four goals down it looked like curtains for the Primroses but by 10.13 of the period the Primroses had netted three goals and kept the crowd in a continual uproar in the last 10 minutes as they tried desperately for the equalizer.

They got a break at 18.50 when big Ray Hache of Saints got the

gate for tripping Billy Hughes. Dowling yanked Ward from the nets and put on terrific pressure. The move almost backfired when Buck Davey got a chance and shot the puck down the ice but it missed.

With 10 seconds left in the game Montague got a faceoff deep in Saints territory and after a wild pileup in front of the net Hughes got his stick on the puck as it came flying out of the melee and made no mistake whatever.

TWO HAT TRICKS

Ray Gionet of St. Dunstan's and Roche MacGregor of Montague, two players who haven't been scoring too many goals for their clubs, each picked up hat tricks.

Coach Dowling got two for Montague and Harley MacLean, Flick Landry, Joe Coyle and Hughes got the others.

Jack MacDonald picked up a brace for Saints while singles went to Ray Hache, Miner MacDonald, Buck Davey, Jean Veilleux and Ed MacDonald.

Referee Orin Carver handed out 10 penalties including two majors to Dave MacLeod of Montague and Jack Kane of Saints for fighting in the first period. Montague picked up only two of the offenses while Saints were assessed with 8.

The game was a nightmare for both goaltenders Gene Ward of Montague and Will Gillis of Saints. Neither was up to par but with the game as wide-open as it was and getting as little protection from their respective defenses as they did they both came up with some nifty saves and could hardly be blamed for the high-scoring. Ward kicked out 31 drives over the rout and Gillis 27.

NEW YORK (CP)—Detroit Red Wings took a firmer grip on second place in the National Hockey League Thursday night by coming from behind to tie the New York Rangers 2-2.

Rookie Norm Ullman stole the puck from Ranger defenceman Bill Gadsby midway through the third period to tie the score unassisted.

The tie as a blow to the hopes of the third-place Rangers of gaining the preferred playoff position. Trailing the Red Wings by two points, they have two games left to Detroit's one. But they must play both against the league-leading Montreal Canadiens while Detroit is at home in the lowly Toronto Maple Leafs.

The Red Wings were on the attack throughout the game, peppering Ranger goalie Lorne Worley with 39 shots while allowing only 15 at their own Glenn Hall.
