Race Feature Goes Tonight

The management of the Covehead raceway have come up with another first for Island motor-sport enthusiasts. Officials of the near-by track informed us yesterday that tonight's program will mark the end of the current racing season for the Covehead track and they have planned a special program for their final performance.

Officials of the Covehead track told us this will be the first time a race of this type has ever been staged on an Island track. What kind of a race will this be? It is called a demolition race and the word demolition explains the objective of the respective competitors.

The last car to survive the race in which the cars are permitted to travel ahead, backwards or anywhere else they see fit with the objective being to put the other cars out of action, is declared the winner.

This columnist has a little difficulty seeing where there is really much skill involved in this type of auto race, but we must admit it should provide some rather interesting spectacles. This race is open to all cars with the exception of stock cars and the only safety requirements are that each driver be equipped with a crash helmet and seat-belt. Whether the respective drivers choose to have glass in their cars or not is up to their own discretion.

Some of the cars competing in this demolition event will be donated by Island car dealers and many will be privately owned entries.

The Covehead track has had a successful season this year and they hope tonight's feature event will attract one of the biggest crowds to date and they plan bigger and better things for next summer.

The race program is scheduled to get underway at 7.30 this evening so if you enjoy this type of sporting activity plan to be on hand when the first event leaves the starting line.

Nine Dash Card Tonight

Laird 'Boots' Frame, track manager at the Summerside raceway has a well balanced and interesting looking nine dash harness racing program set to leave the wire at the western oval tonight.

The feature class on the card will be staged on dashes three and seven and will have six of the Island's top horses leaving the wire in quest of the lion's share of the purse. The field will include: Armond's Buddy, Singalong, Mountain Marie, Mr. McElwyn Key, Hi Jay and Topway.

Armond's Buddy owned, trained and driven by Lee Taylor was extremely sharp in his last outing at the Charlottetown Driving Park and the gelding will probably be well liked by the patrons of the pari-mutuel.

The remaining five entries in this feature class all have ambitions of defeating the Taylor owned entry and collecting the winner's purse.

The second and fifth dashes look interesting with Chief's Gal and High Price looming up as the two favorites. Chief's Gal won her last outing at the CDP in 2:10 and a bit and just barely nipped High Price who was caught on the outside.

High Price the five-year-old horse owned by Rey and Larry Davidson, Sherwood, and teamed by Francis McIsaac will be going all out to avenge the defeat by Chief's Gal in their last meeting. Walter Craig has been handling Chief's Gal which is owned by J. M. Williams, Charlottetown.

High Price has been the sensation of the local racing this summer. The five-year-old stallion started the racing season at the CDP this summer with a mark of 2:30 and now has a mark of 2:12 and was just defeated in 2:10 last week.

The curtain raiser is scheduled to get underway at 8:00 p.m.

The field in the opening dash includes: Belle Texas, All Jollity, Royal Hi Direct, Dot's Boy, Jolly May, Annan Gal and Canarfy.

We think this should prove to be one of the best cards presented at the western oval this year and a large crowd is expected to wend its way to the track to witness the action.

S'side Racing To Go Tonight

SUMMERSIDE — Assaults on the trotting and pacing records at the local track continue every Wednesday night here but chances of either of these records being broken are getting dimmer as the season progresses.

With racing expected to continue until at least Thanksgiving Day there are still a number of optimistic horse owners and fans who believe the trotting record can fall by the wayside.

The mark, 2:08, was equalled recently. One horse owner has been quoted as saying, however, that he is not interested in the trotting record but has his eyes set on the pacing mark. The chances of shattering the record of 2:05 4 before this season is over seems astronomical.

The feature event on tonight's nine dash card, sees Armond's Buddy, Singalong, Hi Jay, Mr. McElwyn Key, Mountain Marie and Topway vying for top honours.

Another feature which will prove almost as popular will see two newcomers to the Summerside Track, High Price and Chief's Gal, racing against Sunday Key, Knight Norris, Blue Mountain Girl and Rio Grande.

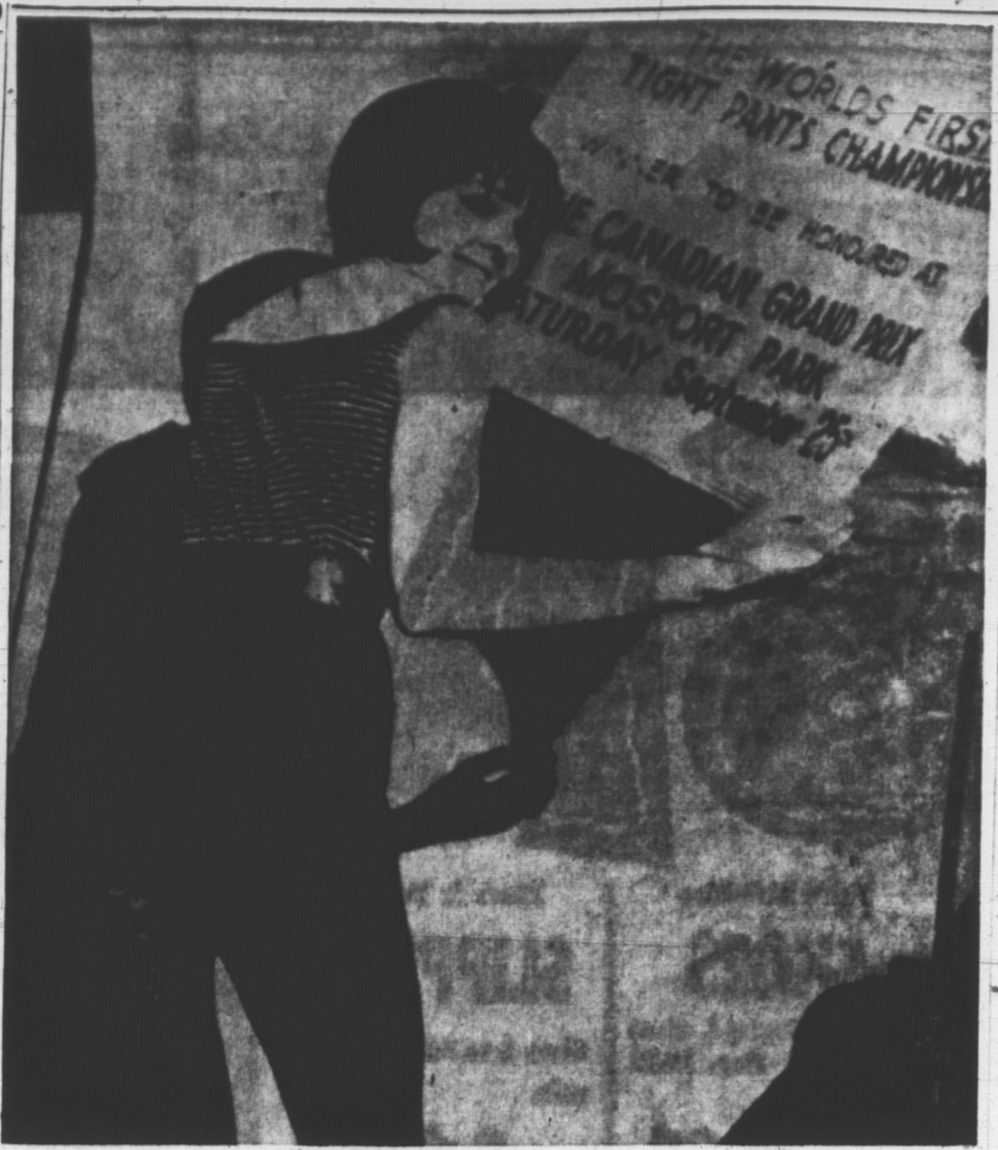

"I know Bob Feller and others have advised me to quit," the great left hander said Tuesday, "but I see no reason why I should. My arm feels fine, my health is good and more important, I know I can still pitch winning ball. Furthermore, I still enjoy it."

This has not been one of Spahn's best years. His win-and-loss record is 7-16 but since joining San Francisco Giants after his release by New York Mets last July he has pitched well.

If the Twins and Giants meet in the series, nothing would please Jim Perry more than to get starting assignment against Gaylord.

While that prospect appears dim because perhaps neither Jim nor Gaylord may get a starting assignment, the brothers from Williamston, N.C. very easily could oppose each other as relievers.

"I can hardly wait for a chance to pitch against him," Jim said. "I sure hope they make it. I talked to him on the telephone Sunday night and told him to get the Giants into the series."

British Soccer Stadiums Get Refit For Tourney

LONDON (CP)—Preparations for soccer's 1966 World Cup already promise to make it the greatest international sporting event in this country since the 1948 Olympic Games.

Then the big event was centred in London. This time the whole country is participating and more than 50,000 foreign visitors are expected to swell the ranks of British fans at eight football grounds around England.

The eyes of the soccer world will be focused on England between July 11 and July 30 when the 16 teams remaining from the 72 that started the gruelling tournament will compete for the Jules Rimet Cup.

To do justice to this vast undertaking £800,000 (\$2,400,000) have been poured into improving grounds and facilities for fans, newspaper men and broadcasters covering the event.

Some £650,000 of this is being spent on the eight football fields at Birmingham, Manchester, Liverpool, Sheffield, Middlesbrough, Sunderland and London's Wembley and White City stadiums. The cash came from two grants—one of £500,000 from the government and the other from the Football Association, soccer's managing body.

This, together with local grants and loans, is being used mainly to bring seating arrangements up to scratch. English fans are not usually fussy about standing or sitting when they watch ordinary league matches. But World Cup standards demand a higher seating capacity and plans call for a total of 39,000 extra seats to be installed.

Ambro Flight Is Invited To Hollywood

BRAMPTON, Ont. (CP)—Elin, Ted and Charles Armstrong of Brampton, owners and breeders of world trotting record-holder Ambro Flight, are considering a formal invitation for their three-year-old filly to take part in the \$50,000 American Trotting Classic Nov. 20 at Hollywood Park in California.

Second in the recent Hamiltonian to Egyptian Candor at Du Quoin, Ill., Ambro Flight set her world record of 1:58.1 Monday in the first heat of the Breeders' Filly Stake at Delaware, Ohio. It was the fastest mile ever trotted in a race over a half-mile track, eclipsing the 1:59.4 set in 1957 at Saratoga Springs, N.Y., by Darn Safe.

"The invitation arrived the morning of her Delaware victory," said Dr. Glen Brown, Armstrong's farm manager. "Provided she's racing well at that time, she will likely go though I haven't spoken yet to P.E.I. native who, trains, drives and decides such things for the filly." Dr. Brown said.

Ambro Flight is due to race Nov. 10 in the Dexter Cup at New York but could be flown to California in time for the 1 1/4 mile trotting classic.
