CONVICTIONS.—John Locheren, of County Line Station, Lot 67, and Mary McKinnon, Mt. UNITED STATES.

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 8. Official bulletin, 6.30 p. m.: At 12 to day the President's temperature was 98.4; pulse 94; respiration 17. At evening dressing (5.30 p. m.), the temperature was 99.1; pulse 100; respiration 1. He has taken a liberal amount of food, both solid and fluid, with apparent relish. By special request of the President it has been made our duty to say in this public manner to Surgeon General J. K. Barnes, Surgeon J. J. Woodward and Dr. Robert Reyburn, that in dispensing with their services as his medical attendants, he was actuated only by the wish to relieve them of labor and responsibility which in his improved condition, he could no longer impose upon them. Both the President and Mrs. Garfield desire to express to these gentlemen personally, and in a public manner, their high appreciation of the great skill and discretion they so constantly exercised as associate council in the management of his case up to the present time. INDEPENDENCE, Mo., Sept. 8. Five masked robbers stopped the Chicago and Alton Western Express and mail train last night, near Glendale, and held the passengers in terror with loaded rifles and revolvers. Two robbers knocked down the express messenger and blew open the safe in the express car, robbing it of \$30,000, and then went through the pockets of every passenger, taking all their valuables, after which they disappeared in the woods. A posse are searching for the robbers, and great excitement prevails.

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 8. Over 200 persons were burned to death by recent bush fires in Northern Michigan, and it is feared the number may reach 500. More than 50 townships are almost entirely destroyed and great suffering and distress prevails.

BELLIN, Sept. 8. Emperor William and the Crown Prince started for Dantzic to-night, and will arrive there at six on Friday morning.

DETROIT, Sept. 8. Accounts show that the crops in Bingham, Sherman and Paris townships in Huron county are harvested and are lost by fire. The remains of a family of seven named Redmond were found in a well near Charleston. The remains of Henry Cole was also found near Charleston and a family named Susula. In Paris township Mrs. Diefert and three children were burned to death. In Watertown a family named Dennison are believed to be burned. Two families named Thornton and Lee it is feared were burned near Richmondville. The wind blew a gale carrying the fire with a rapidity that often prevented escape. On Tuesday afternoon the wind changed, and it is feared this will add new destruction by sending the flames over other sections. The wind is high and the country helpless. There are no signs of rain. One hundred families lost all their property and this year's crops, reducing them to absolute immediate want.

NORFOLK, Va., Sept. 8. Fire is raging in Dismal Swamp. Despatches from North Carolina say the farmers are stacking their corn crops for fodder, and the rice crop is cut off.

PARIS, Sept. 6. The Prefect of Constantine, Algeria, received a despatch announcing that 61 persons were burned to death in one day in recent forest fires, and 632 dwellings destroyed.

LONDON, Sept. 8. The steamer "Pennsylvania," from Philadelphia, yesterday, spoke, 3rd inst., British steamer "Rochester," from Boston, Aug. 5, for London, with shaft broken. The "Rochester" is in good condition, and her cargo of cattle is doing well. Weather fine. The election in the County Tyrone, to fill the vacancy in the House of Commons caused by the appointment of Lyton (Liberal) as commissioner under the Land Act, resulted in the return of Thos. A. Dickson, Liberal.
