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PETAL BUNS

Makes 2 dozen buns

Measure 1 c. lukewarm water into small bowl; crumble and add 2 cakes Best Yeast—or stir in 2 tps. granulated sugar and sprinkle with 2 small envelopes (or 2 tps.) Best dry Yeast. Let stand 10 mins., THEN stir well. Meantime, cream ½ c. butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine; blend in ½ cup granulated sugar and 1 tsp. salt. Add 4 well-beaten eggs, part at a time, beating in well after each addition. Stir in dissolved yeast and 3 c. sifted all-purpose flour; beat until smooth and elastic. Work in 2½ c. (about) sifted all-purpose flour. Knead on floured board until elastic. Place in greased bowl; grease top. Cover. Let rise in warm place until doubled—about 1½ hrs. Punch down dough; divide into 3 equal pieces. Roll each into an 8" square. Spread each square with 1 tsp. soft butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine then with thick raspberry jam. Roll up as for jelly roll; cut each roll into 8 equal pieces. Place in greased muffin pans; using scissors, cut an X in each bun. Brush with melted butter or Blue Bonnet Margarine. Cover. Let rise until doubled—about 45 mins. Bake in moderate hot oven, 375°, 15 to 18 mins.
