CONTRACT BRIDGE

You are the dealer, both sides vulnerable. What would you bid with each of the following four hands?

- 1. ♠AQ8 ♥AJ7 ♦AK5 ♣Q864
2. ♠K7 ♥Q8632 ♦AKJ94 ♣8
3. ♠—♥AQ86 ♦AKJ74 ♣KQ952
4. ♠K86 ♥AQ4 ♦KQ765 ♣K9

1. One club. Despite the characteristic notrump features of the hand, the proper opening bid is one club. The point count requirements of opening notrump bids are rigid. A one notrump opening announces a point count of 16 to 18; two notrump shows 22 to 24 points. This hand contains 20 points, and hence falls into neither one category nor the other. Since partner is required to respond to a suit bid if he has 6 or more points, there need be no fear of missing a game if he passes. A combined count of 26 points is generally necessary for game to be made in balanced hands. The intention is to jump to three notrump if partner's response to the club bid is one diamond, one heart, one spade, or one notrump.

Treasure Return Is Not Good News

LONDON (CP) — Augustus Zaleski, president of the Polish government in exile, heard Wednesday that his country's art treasures may be returned to Poland by the Quebec government.

"I am sorry," he said. "Very sorry."
Zaleski, elderly leader of about 160,000 poles in Britain, was told about the Quebec report by a reporter in his stately drawing-room.
"It is not good news," he said sadly. "I hope it doesn't happen."
"Mr. President," as he is greeted by his six exiled cabinet ministers, was foreign secretary when he helped to arrange storage of the treasures in Canada.
"DON'T KNOW" NOW
" Naturally, I have a deep interest in them. I always knew Mr. Duplessis would never give them up to the Communists, but I don't know about the new man."
Premier Paul Sauve said last week he would be pleased to have the Quebec cabinet hear a request from Most Rev. J. C. Cody, Roman Catholic bishop of London, Ont., that the treasures be returned to Poland.
Two trunks containing items from the collection of tapestries, coronation robes and art works were sent to Poland from the Ottawa branch of the Bank of Montreal earlier this year, before Msgr. Cody made a pilgrimage to the east European country.
He said many of Poland's literary treasures were destroyed by the Germans, including his own collection of nearly 4,000 books. In the 1956 Hungarian revolution, he said, the Russians destroyed many art treasures.
"It should not be allowed to happen with our treasures. Even if the Communists did guarantee to protect them—well, you just cannot accept guarantees from them."
Zaleski—he says he leads the only legal Polish government—carries out his work in a huge

Crime Comics Are Blamed

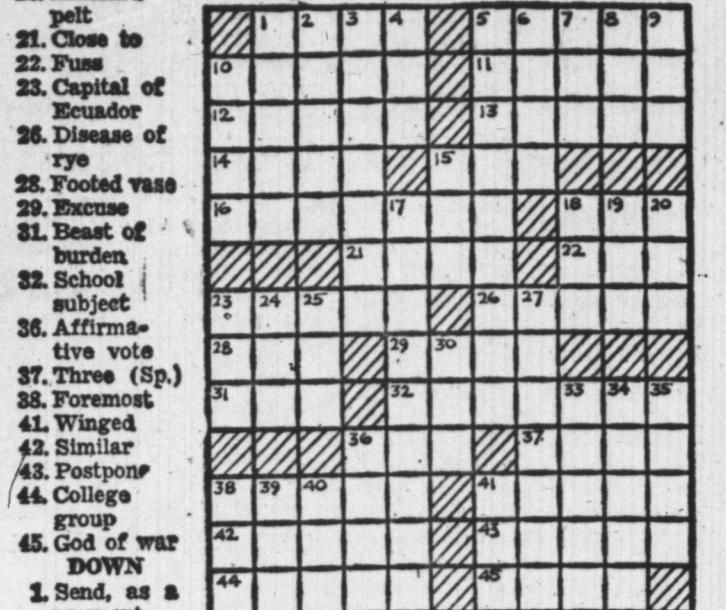
MONTREAL (CP)—Two young crime comic book readers are in police cells in the wake of a crime wave in the Eastern Townships.
Provincial police said the boys' brothers are being held for six car thefts, armed robbery, seven burglaries, threats uttered at gunpoint and illegal possession of weapons.
They are 16 and 11 years old. Their father has had a nervous breakdown since their arrest last weekend.
Provincial police detective Yvan Lamiere quoted the healthy, well-mannered youngsters as saying they read numerous crime comics and decided to "get a racket of our own going."
"They didn't agree with the comics on the idea of crooks always getting caught," the detective said. "They figured they'd have a big time and get away with it."

Stole Several Cars

POLICE SAID THE BOYS STOLE SEVERAL CARS last week in a half dozen communities southeast of Montreal. They drove the cars until they ran out of gas, then abandoned them. They were in two accidents and the 11-year-old is believed to have suffered a broken nose in one.
"Just for the fun of it," they stole about \$2,000 worth of goods from summer cottages, police said. The town was caught at a cottage in a low near the border of Quebec with Vermont.

BAXTER TAKES THE BAIT

Slow Progress Is Reported On Columbia River Parleys

OITAWA (CP) — Canadian-American talks on co-operative development of the Columbia River are making slow progress, it was indicated Wednesday at the halfway point of weeklong discussions.
Two sessions of the International Joint Commission's regular meeting—one of two held each year—have been devoted so far to the Columbia and more are expected to be.

Division of downstream benefits on the Columbia and two reports on the projected project top priority of the week-long talks, which began its closed sessions Monday on problems arising from boundary waters.
A final communique is expected Friday. Hopes for a mid-week one on the Columbia appeared dashed by slow progress.

Big Study on Project

Filed Tuesday with the commission was a six-inch-thick report on the possible impact the Passamaquoddy development might have on Maine-New Brunswick fisheries in the Bay of Fundy area. Small herrings or sardines are the chief commercial fish involved.

Friday, a bulky \$4,000,000 engineering report on the feasibility of the Passamaquoddy is to be filed for digestion by Joint Commission members. It wasn't known whether the two reports will be made public, at least until after they have been studied.

It has been hinted here that the United States, through its corps of engineers, may be more enthusiastic about the Passamaquoddy than the Canadian section of the IJC. One reason is that American agencies in computing costs have the benefit of special low-interest loans from the federal government. The Canadian view is that this makes for a non-realistic cost picture.

The Columbia is of special importance. It is understood that the American share of the commission is agreed to recommend that Canada share about 50 per cent of the U.S. from water stored on the Canadian side of the Columbia.



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
