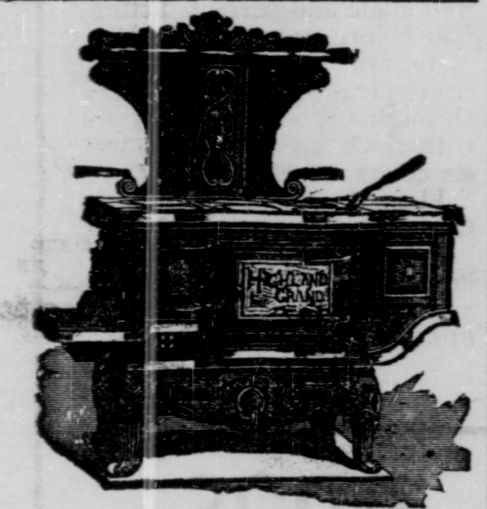

**SUMMERSIDE BREAKWATER.**  
 Letter From Mr. T. A. McLean.

Sir,—In answer to the contradiction by Messrs. Holman and McLeod; re the statement made by me at York, I will say that they did not tell enough of the truth when they stated, "The facts are that neither of us had a tender accepted for the Summerside breakwater, and the figure for which the present contractor is to do the work is not higher than former tenders but 50 or 60 per cent lower." For men who are not contractors and never had been, they display quite a knowledge, for they make the statement that the present contract is an lower than former tenders, which is admission of my statement at York that three times has the breakwater done duty for election purposes.

The report in your paper was incorrect as to the price of contract. I made no reference to the cost of the former tenders, but stated the contract was let now to Messrs Macdonald & Moffatt, of Sydney, for about \$60,000. The rest of your report is correct. I may have been misinformed about the legal contractors, but I will say this,—if Messrs. McLeod and Holman had been dealing with an unfriendly government and treated as other men have been whose certified check has been held for similar bonds, they would have had severe reminders that if their names were not on the tenders they were on something equally binding and they would be held liable. Hence they are in a position to take advantage of a legal technicality to make me out a liar at a public meeting.

I repeat the statement. This is the third time Summerside Breakwater was tendered for previous to an election contest being held in the County. The first time, I am informed, Messrs. McLeod and Holman's check was handed back for \$10,000, the amount called for in the advertisement. The specification the second time was changed and ordinary stone chosen instead of granite. The next tender received from the Summerside syndicate, I am informed, was higher than the first, showing the mistake they made the first time was not going to be repeated, and if they did not get the check back the second time it was because they did not put it up, which would not be their fault.

The contract hung fire the second time. Now the work is under contract for a sum much lower than formerly because the specification has been changed and quantity and values changed, and I trust that the present contractors will make more money than the first syndicate, who were in it to lose had the Government kept the deposit.

My reference to Messrs McLeod and Holman, at York, was not in any way to belittle the men who had courage to deposit \$10,000 to secure a large contract for their town, but to throw some light on a contract that the government candidate endorsed the Government for procuring for the Island; and when Messrs McLeod and Holman undertook to enlighten the people about the present price, had they stated the amount of the tenders they were interested in the public would be enlightened somewhat as they speak with knowledge when they tell the public that the present price is from 50 to 60 per cent lower than former tenders. This is information they did not intend to convey when they wrote the letter, as their denial of ever being contractors would lead to the belief that they were unable to give even as much information.

If this contract is let for say \$60,000, and it is 60 per cent. less than the former ones, \$96,000 would be about the price tendered for, although I have heard the tender was the first time \$125,000, or over 100 per cent., and it was found too low to proceed with, which necessitated the change and cheapening of the specification and the keeping of faith with Summerside, and now we are going to have it running all winter solely in the interest of labor.

The average daily yield of the whole herd during that period was upwards of 32 lbs. each. The individual yield of each cow, together with the percentage of butter fat, can be seen on the premises.
