"GRAND DESERT" A WRECK—The wreck of the Magdalene Islands fishing schooner, "Grand Desert" at Bayfield, North Shore, on Monday night reported in yesterday's Guardian, occurred when the schooner went ashore in a dense fog. It being impossible to see East Point Light between 11 and 12 o'clock. The log was not registering well and the vessel had gone 18 miles out of her course. Soundings were being taken when she struck. There was very little wind or sea at the time and Capt. LePays and his crew of three men had no difficulty in landing with their personal effects. After the schooner went ashore a heavy north wester set in, making attempts to float her futile and a message from Bayfield yesterday stated that she is now broken up and a total wreck. The vessel which was 19 years old and 65 tons burden, was owned in the Magdalene Islands and had a cargo of 1,600 barrels of herring for Port Elgin, N.B. It is understood that there was insurance on the cargo but none on the vessel. The scene of the wreck is about a mile to the westward of where the ill-fated Sovinto was wrecked over fifteen years ago.
