

Russians Planning To Buy Canadian Fish Freezer

M. P. parliamentary assistant to the Minister of Fisheries, Hon. T. W. L. Prowse, Lieutenant Governor of P. E. I., Hon. Douglas MacKinnon, P. E. I. Minister of Fisheries, Hon. E. P. Foley, M. L. A.; Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell; Acting Mayor W. E. Jenkins of Summerside, Group Captain W. H. Sweetman, commanding officer R. C. A. F. Station Summerside; Lt. Col. A. W. Rogers, aide-de-camp to the Lieutenant Governor.

At a reception in the Officers Mess at R. C. A. F. Station Summerside, the Russians enjoyed P. E. I. Oysters and lobsters and chatted with guests and newsmen. Asked by these exchange visits would be continued between Canada and Russia, they said that it was their hope that the peoples of the two countries would visit each other, and speaking for the industry they represented they expressed a desire to have Canadian fishermen visit and become acquainted with Russian fishermen.

THE IRON CURTAIN

To an inquiry on the effect of the so called Iron Curtain on entry and travel in Russia by Canadian citizens, they have assurance that visits by Canadians would be welcomed by the Russian people, and denied the suggestion of lack of

freedom to enter and travel in Russia. They expressed a sincere desire for a better understanding of each others country and peoples, and indicated they believed that this would do much to ease world tension and lessen international distrust.

At the reception at Summerside the Russian visitors appeared to enjoy Island oysters and replied that oysters were the closest to Russian fisheries, but lobsters were new to them, the closest being large crabs which were caught in considerable numbers in some areas. They expressed an interest in the contrasting landscapes of Newfoundland and P. E. I. and in the various types of fish and methods of catching and processing employed by fishermen in the two Provinces.

In reply to questions, in regard to the large Russian fisheries trawler which brought the party from Russia to Newfoundland and which will pick them up at Halifax on completion of their Canadian tour, the Russians showed the press pictures of the ship which carries a crew of 103, and described the way in which the fish catch was handled on board the ship, which also served as a sea-going processing plant for her catch.
