More Information Wanted.

ALTHOUGH the time for receiving tenders for building the hull of the new steamer of the Southport ferry expired on Thursday last, the 25th May, no public announcement concerning the result has been made.

We ask the Patriot to publish the names of the tenderers, the amount of each tender and the date and time each was received and opened at the Public Works office.

It is more than hinted that the man who made the tender for Sol Clarke did not see the specification at the Public Works Department until the 25th May—the day on which the tenders were to have been opened and considered.

It will be remembered in this connection that during the late session of the Legislature Hon. Mr. Peters stated that it was the intention of the Government to have this steamer built on the Island, at Mount Stewart if possible.

When the Patriot makes the explanation asked for we may have something more to say on the subject.

The World's Exposition. A Glance Through the State Buildings.

EACH of the states of the great North American Republic has a "State Building" here. The state buildings collectively form a large community by themselves. Every style of architecture of every age of the world is in some degree represented by them; and there are some styles represented which are entirely new and original.

What is beauty, but God as he comes to the eye, And Hope but God present in sorrow?"

"Virginia building" is a fac-simile of the "Mount Vernon Mansion"—the home of George Washington. The small rooms, with their low ceilings, are in striking contrast with the largeness and highness of the grand mansions of these latter days.

New Jersey, Maine, Maryland, West Virginia, Delaware, Rhode Island, Indiana, Wisconsin, Michigan and others of the older States have admirable buildings elegantly furnished.

Decidedly the largest state building upon the exposition grounds is that of Illinois. The various productions of high standing, the heroes portrayed—not forgetting the greatest of them all—Abraham Lincoln's coat worn, at the time he was assassinated, and many other mementoes of the great president are here shown.

A splendid exhibition of taxidermy is the chief attraction of the Kansas building. All the wild animals of the state are here shown—as natural as in life.

A Boom in Business. Last week Mark Wright & Co. loaded three schooners for Cape Breton ports, containing 100 dozen chairs, 18 dozen rockers, 200 bedsteads, 50 washstands, 100 tables, 13 bedroom suits, 25 lounges and 72 mattresses, besides a large quantity of miscellaneous furniture.

South Dakota also needs immigrants; and its exhibit is, also, a great advertisement. Among the things shown in this building are a number of highly polished and very beautiful specimens of petrified wood.

At the door of the North Dakota building is a stuffed ox attached to a cart, represented as the only means of transport across West and North of St. Paul previous to 1871. In view of this representation, the wonderful progress of the West and North, made apparent at the Exhibition, is the more striking.

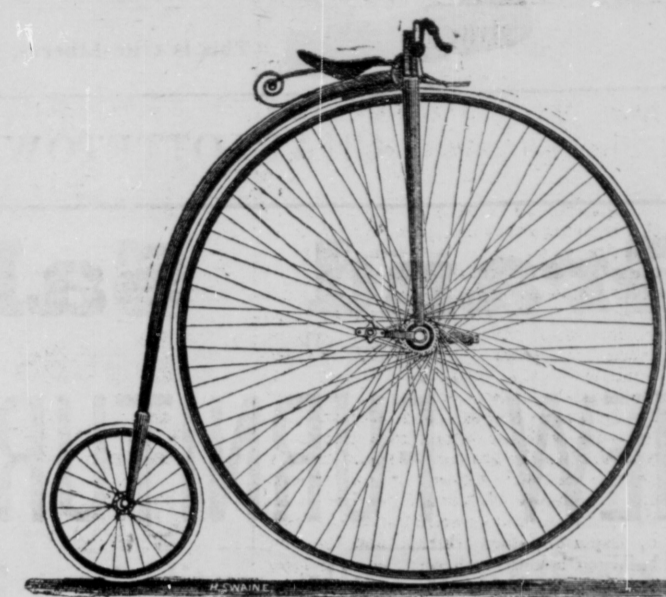
