Macquarrie Has Questions On Trade Mission To W.I.

OTTAWA—The intense interest that the Atlantic provinces have in the British West Indies was indicated here by Heath Macquarrie, MP for St. John's, Nfld., in a speech on the Commons' report paper seeking information about Canadian trade missions to the islands of St. Kitts, Nevis, Anguilla and Montserrat; a forest survey for the island of Dominica was completed in the summer of 1962.

Under technical assistance of the Caribbean area, both project assistance and technical assistance have been provided since May 1962.

These projects include a deep water wharf and warehouse project for the island of St. Vincent expected to be completed in early 1964; a quantity of port handling equipment is being purchased for the islands of St. Kitts, Nevis, Anguilla and Montserrat.

From St. Matthew's, the funeral procession wound down to the Lincoln Memorial, around it and across Memorial Bridge. The broad avenue leading from the Lincoln Memorial to the cemetery was lined with troops.

Before the funeral procession arrived, a woman placed an Irish flag at the grave site. She told reporters she was Mrs. Walter Kostecki, wife of an army surgeon.

"I am Irish and my mother knew Rose Kennedy the president's mother when she was Boston's Irish rose," Mrs. Kostecki said. She said her maiden name was Mary Louise Sullivan.

CADETS ON HAND

There were also 38 smartly dressed Irish cadets there. The cadets, from the Irish Military College, had performed for Kennedy when he visited Ireland last July. The Kennedy family had asked that they take part in the funeral ceremonies and they flew in Sunday night with Irish President Eamon de Valera.

Standing at the end of the entrance avenue was the army's file and drum corps—a ceremonial unit dressed in the cocked hats and scarlet-cuffed uniforms of the army of revolution. The throngs were mostly silent. But at the corner of the U.S. Treasury building, a woman broke into a high-pitched wail.

Last Thursday night, Kennedy was quoted from the Bible: "Where there is no vision the people perish." And again, "Except the Lord watches the city, the guard watches in vain."

"Listening taut-faced under the great dome of the cathedral were two former presidents, Harry S. Truman and Dwight D. Eisenhower. The third living former chief executive, Herbert Hoover, 89, is not in robust health and could not come. Towing in the procession, near him sat Prince Philip, American president in braided uniform was the indomitable old figure of Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia.

In a poignant touch, soloist Luigi Vena of Boston sang "Ave Maria." Vena had sung this hymn at the Kennedy wedding.

GRAVE ON HILL

The grave site is on a hillside below the Lee Mansion, an old home preserved on the cemetery grounds. The whole property once belonged to the wife of Robert E. Lee, the southern general in the Civil War general.

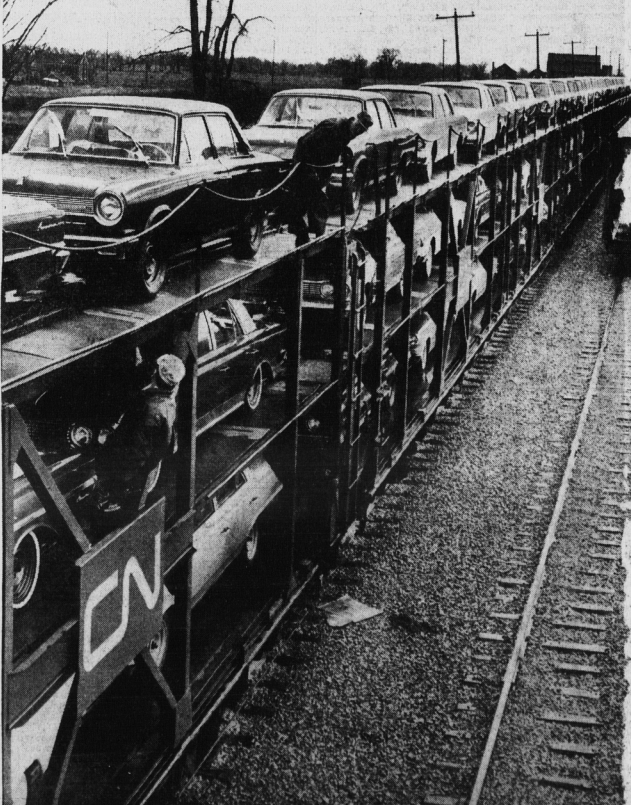
