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**Auto Insurance Rates  
To Take Jump For '65**

Steady increases in the frequency and cost of automobile accidents will mean higher insurance rates in 1965 the Prince Edward Island Board of Insurance Underwriters said today. Although individual rates will vary according to driving records and other factors, the average increase in insurance cost in the province in 1965 will be about 25 per cent.

Motorists will feel the effect of an increase in the driver's own car, often costs more. High frequency of one-car accidents, coupled with higher repair costs, results in higher insurance premiums.

Insurance rates are lowest for those car owners who, according to accident statistics, are least likely to get into an accident. If an owner is under 25 years of age, or has a male driver under 25 using his car occasionally, or if he drives to work, uses his car for business, or has had an accident within three years, his statistical likelihood of becoming involved in an accident increases and his insurance rate rises accordingly.

SUMMERSIDE — It was learned last night that Mark Alfred Broome of Freeland was found dead Thursday night shortly before 9 p.m. in the barn situated on his property.

An autopsy was held yesterday in Charlottetown and no request will be held.

The Summerside RCMP detachment was notified shortly after the deceased was found.

Mr. Broome had not been well since the fall of 1963 when he was shot in the head while operating a bulldozer for the firm of Curran and Briggs Ltd. in a gravel pit west of here.

Following the shooting, Mr. Broome was transferred to Prince County Hospital where surgery was performed. He was transferred to a hospital in Halifax where he underwent surgery and had a splinter removed in his head.

Damage had left him with little use of one of his arms.

GEORGETOWN — The death occurred suddenly in the Prince Edward Island Hospital in Charlottetown Thursday, Dec. 3, of John Alden Macdonald of Georgetown, aged 34.

**Freighter Still Aground  
After Freeing Attempts**

THE FOUNDATION tug Valiant straining the tow line yesterday morning in her effort to free the Greek freighter Agios Nicolaos III from the reef at Seacow Head. Standing by during the operation is the Foundation Venture. The tugless attempt seen above was at 11:30 yesterday morning. In the lower corner the shore of Seacow Head can be seen, the grounded freighter is only some 100 yards from shore.

Despite a combined effort by the two Foundation tugs Venture and Valiant the 5,200 ton Agios Nicolaos III remains aground on the reef at Seacow Head.

The tug attempt was made shortly before midnight last evening and they were aided by an eight-foot tide and an off shore wind, but it was to no avail.

An attempt had been made earlier in the day, at 11:30 the morning, but it was fruitless. Only the tug Valiant was used in the morning try. The Venture was standing close by. Some 200 people gathered to watch this attempt from the shore, only 100 yards away.

The freighter went aground Tuesday evening during the storm that raged throughout the Maritimes and sent ships scurrying for safe harbors. The Agios Nicolaos III was enroute from Summerside to load a cargo of 10,000 bags of potatoes bound for Jacksonville, Fla. She is carrying a crew of 36.
