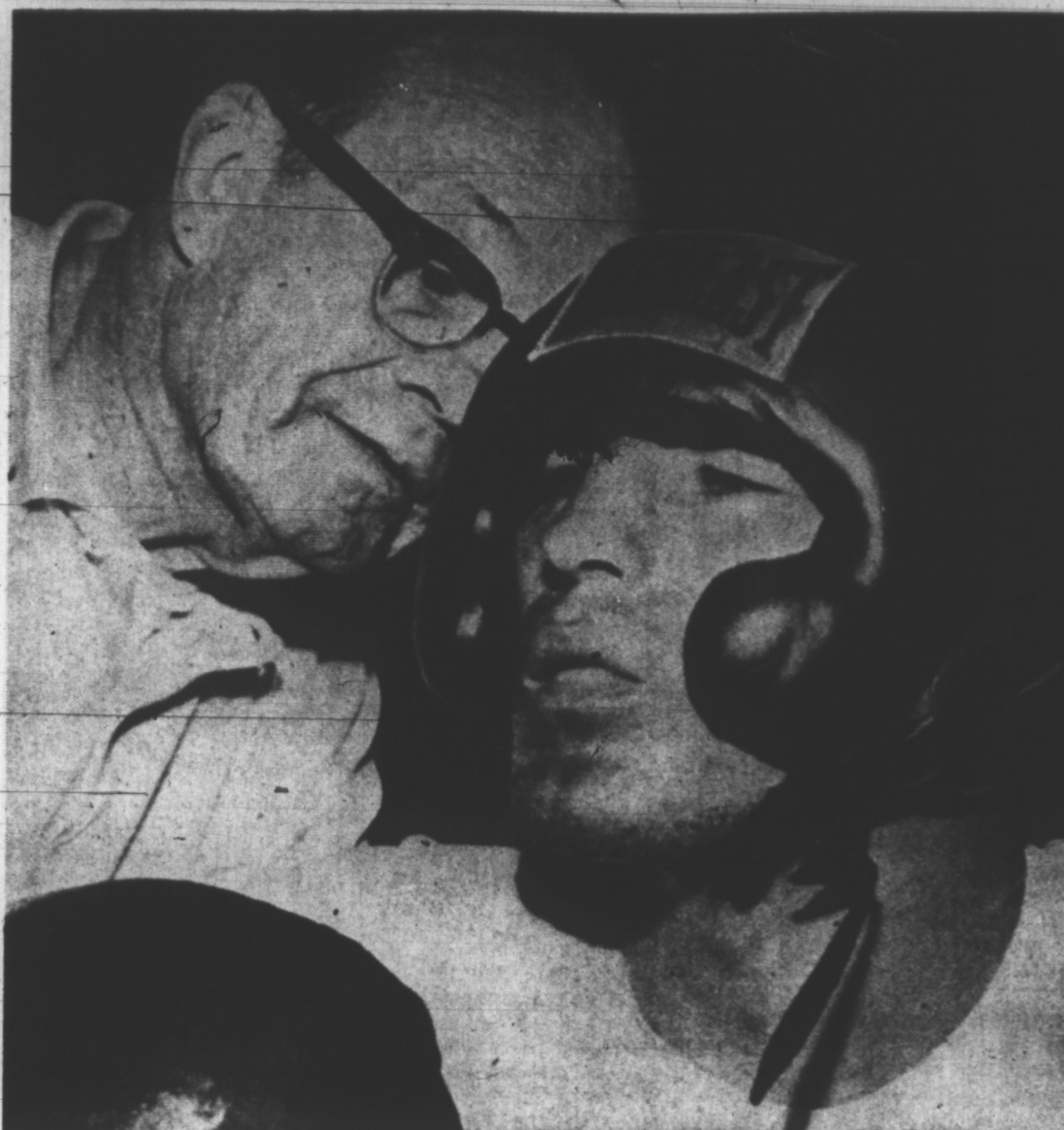

Cliff Lumsdon of Toronto, who won the 1956 swim over Park and who finished right behind the Californian in 1954, and 1955 and 1958 also will be competing. Greta Anderson Sonnichsen, who was the first woman to finish in 1956, 1957 and last year, is one of five women entered in the event.
