

Prince County Older Boys' Conference

An Older Boys' Conference for Prince County was held this past week-end in the O'Leary United Church. Keith Stetson registered fifty-two boys from 12 to 17 years of age. Those needing bulleting were directed to the homes by Blair Bernard. The Conference opened with a welcome by the Director and Minister of the Host Church, Rev. Robert Wagner.

A sing-song was led by Mr. Wagner, a game was directed by Mr. Earle Jelly, and introductions were made by each person present. After the plan and purpose of the Conference were given, the officers of the gathering were elected under the direction of Rev. W. H. Forsyth. 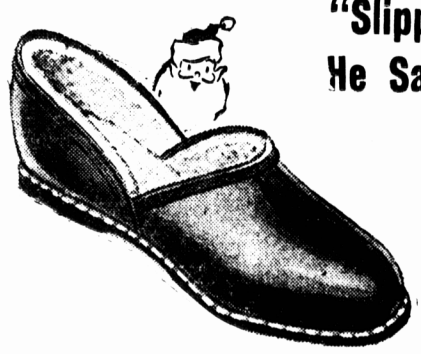
