

S'ide Aces Defeat Milton 9-4 To Capture Intermediate B Title

The Summerside Aces won the intermediate "B" hockey championship of Prince Edward Island at Raceway Stadium last night, defeating the Milton Hornets 9-4 on the game, and 19-10 on the round. The Schurman - Baglione boys had to come from behind to win the game, the Hornets getting the first three goals on the contest which had them breathing down the necks of the Aces with only a one-goal deficit on the two-game series. The Milton boys scored two quick ones with an 11-second interval between them early in the period, and while skating six men to four with two Aces draping the penalty box at the sixteen minute mark, they added another making the score 3-0 in their favor. The Aces were still one man short when Paul Schurman put the Summerside boys back in the game by scoring two counters. The first one, the result of a solo dash was the prettiest goal of the evening. He took a pass from Harris to notch the other one, scoring it from an almost impossible angle. The period ended 3-2.

From then on in the result was never in doubt. The Aces fired two unanswered goals in the second session, and outscored the Milton boys 5 to 1 in the final frame. In the middle canto Charlie Ready objected two two-minute penalty for roughing and sent referee Richard crashing to the ice with a haymaker. For this he received a match misconduct. Paul Schurman, with three goals and one assist, received the Holman Men's Wear "most valuable player" award. Mooney Gallant had two counters and one helper. For the Milton boys, Clayton MacLean was the big gun, being in every scoring play with two goals and two assists.

At the end of the game, Mayor Henry Wedge presented the Physical Fitness trophy for the intermediate "B" championship to Garth Gay, captain of the Aces. The Ace management has been in touch with Fredericton, New Brunswick "B" champs, and although nothing was settled, there is a possibility that Fredericton will play a sudden-death game at Raceway Stadium next Saturday night, ice conditions permitting.
