Pollo Cases Slight

Dr. Wendell MacDonald, City Health Officer, told the Council that poliomyelitis had caused little or no worry here this year. He said that of the six reported cases in the city only one indicated residual paralysis. He thought the urban dwellers were better off in this respect than the rural people as in a city there were many more main forms of the disease which aided in building immunity to serious attack.

Councillor Johnstone suggested that the roadway on the west side of Government Pond be closed to traffic and an effort made to beautify the land between the pond and the Prince Edward Island Hospital. He cited the need for the maintaining of as many "open spaces" in city limits as was possible and thought the five acres available there would be a really beautiful section and an asset to the city.

Another matter for brief debate was the trampled down earth on the south side of the Post Office. It was felt this could be grassed and fenced in to keep people from spoiling the appearance of the whole area.

Street Parking

A general discussion of the street parking problem found Councillor Farmer, chairman of the Police Committee, advising the Council that at present we were running 10 years ahead of the estimated number of automobile vehicles in use. He said there were far more cars than ever before and many of the owners have no garages. A large group of car owners live in apartment houses with no garage facilities and many more board in private homes. This class of owner has been forced to leave their cars on the streets overnight.

Councillor McCormac, chairman of the Fire Committee, said that in a test supervised by fire inspectors recently the efficiency of the two fire Department pumps was shown to be down 10 per cent from last year. He said the time was at hand when a new machine would have to be purchased. He also suggested a future installation of more sprinkler connector systems in private industry to instantly announce in the firehall the presence of a fire in any of the buildings thus protected.

Councillor F. J. Storey, chairman of the Streets Committee, said that all figures were available. He said the department would be within its estimated figure for the year's street work. He told the Council that within the past two weeks the department had laid off all its casual labor and was carrying on now with its own semi-permanent employees.

Public Property

Councillor G. R. Keefe, chairman of Public Property, asked for greater Police inspection of the Public Library where some damage had been caused recently by missiles thrown at lights and windows. He also suggested that the parking of motor vehicles on the public squares of the city must cease if they are to be maintained properly.

There was a brief discussion regarding complaints of citizens who had painted their houses and then found the streets being excavated and the dust spoiling the paint jobs. The Council members, while appreciating the position of the house owners, felt that there was no liability attached to the city or the contractors and that if any recompense were given any owner they would be setting a dangerous precedent.

Civic Pension Scheme

Councillor Johnstone presented a resolution asking the Finance Committee negotiate with an actuary or an actuarial company for the purpose of determining the soundness of the Civic Employees Pension scheme. The resolution, which was passed, added that the price of such actuarial services is to be submitted to the Council before services are engaged.

The Police report submitted by Chief C. W. MacArthur showed there had been 69 arrests made in the city last month with 66 convictions being obtained. There were 13 cases of motor vehicle law violations and convictions were obtained in all of them. A total of 284 traffic tickets for motor vehicle violations were issued and \$132 collected in fines; at the same time there were 41 tickets issued for other traffic offences and \$41 collected.

Continued from page 1 Vishinsky said adoption of the 21-country resolution submitted by the U. S. would lead to a break-down of the Panmunjon talks and extension of the war. The Western resolution, backed by Canada, calls for a cease-fire on the basis of non-forfeiture of territory.

Then he turned down compromise resolutions presented by Mexico and Peru. Vishinsky said the main point in these resolutions was that they would let the prisoners decide whether or not they wished to return home. He argued that prisoners are subject to military discipline and therefore cannot make such a decision.

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United Church Presbytery Meets

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in regular session in the Hearts Hall of Trinity United Church, Charlottetown, on the 28th, October, and was presided over by chairman, the Rev. D. W. MacPherson of Murray Harbour.

Two new members were welcomed and reports of their inductions were received. They were the Rev. A. Frank MacLean of Trinity Church, Charlottetown and the Rev. Murdoch Fraser of Montague.

The transfer of Rev. W. G. Dickson, formerly of O'Leary, was effected. Mr. Dickson has accepted a call to Osgood, Ontario, in the Montreal-Ottawa Conference of the Church.

Reports on the recent meeting of the General Council of the Church in Hamilton, Ontario were given by Mr. Richard Creed of Murray River, Mr. Allison Poffitt of Preetown, and Mr. George Leard of O'Leary.

Each stressed the advance of the church into the frontier regions and the expansion of new industrial areas of the country, and the opening of the new mission field in Central Africa in the copperbelt area.

For church expansion in Canada the Presbytery re-stated their intention to raise the sum of \$20,000 for the campaign for the United Church Training School which has been accepted and promoted through-out the presbytery, with several charges already fully or over subscribed.

The new scheme of circulating the United Church Observer with a full coverage of United Church families through the co-operation of official boards was discussed and recommended for discussion among congregations and official boards.
