THIRTY-ONE horses were sold in Montreal during last week for \$5,000.

MR. J. A. MORRISON, of the firm of J. S. McLean & Co., is at the Rankin.

OVER 400 tons of freight were shipped over the I. C. R. from Halifax last week.

HENRY LONGWORTH, Esq., returned home from Kingston Exhibition this morning.

THE "Northampton" and "Charger" returned to Halifax, from East Point, on Tuesday.

The blind in the United Kingdom number about half the population of Prince Edward Island.

The total value of exports by steamers from Summerside, for the week ending Tuesday was \$15,563.

The receipts of the Montreal exhibition, were \$20,000 being \$6,000 less than the receipts last year.

ORDERS have been received in Montreal from Australia for \$70,000 worth of railway supplies for that colony.

The value of Canadian cabbages exported from Montreal to the Eastern States since the 9th inst., was \$18,000.

MR. Wood, an Australian Commissioner has given orders in Montreal for \$70,000 worth of railway supplies for that colony.

The harvest in England, after all, came out much better than anticipated. Root crops as well as cereals have been wonderfully good.

We learn that over three hundred dollars' worth of through tickets to Boston were sold at the Railway Station, in this city, yesterday.

THE Montreal exhibition closed on Saturday. The aggregate attendance was sixty thousand, or twenty-five thousand less than last year. The total receipts were under \$20,000, or six thousand dollars less than in 1881. The falling off is attributed to bad weather.

"CANADA FIRST" principles evidently don't go down in the Province of Quebec. The weekly journal of that name established in Montreal some months since in advocacy of independence for the Dominion has retired from the field for want of support.

A YOUNG Toronto bookbinder has eloped with a woman aged 56 years, married and a mother of four children. The two boarded in a Temperance street boarding-house. The husband left for the West last night, accompanied with a heavy Colt's revolver.

THE Government of New Brunswick have won a rousing victory in Kent; V. I. I. and LeBlanc having been elected by 1200 majority. As far as heard from, the returns, with three places to hear from, are as follows: Wheten, 1,629; LeBlanc, 1,600; Sayre, 469; Richard, 319.

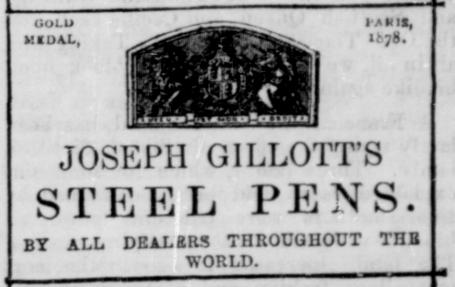
