Representatives at the Methodist Ecumenical Conference.

The four hundred delegates are divided equally between the clergy and laity. The two leading Methodist bodies of the United States, North and South, have 118 delegates. The three colored Methodist bodies of America send 28 delegates, the Protestant, Wesleyan, Free and Independent Methodists jointly fourteen delegates, and the other small sects of American Methodists, of which there are eight, are represented by the remaining 40 delegates, including the 22 which Canada Methodism has sent. From the United States the Methodist Episcopal Church sends 80 delegates; Methodist Episcopal Church, South, 38; African Methodist Episcopal Church 12; African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church 10, Colored Methodist Episcopal Church, 6; Evangelical Association, 6; Union American Methodist Episcopal Church, 2; Union American Protestant Church, 2; Methodist Protestant Church, 6; American Wesleyan Church, 4; Free Methodist Church, 2; Independent Methodist Church, 2; Congregational Methodist Church, 2. The United Brethren and one or two smaller sects divide the remaining six delegates. From the Dominion of Canada the Methodist Church of Canada sends 12 delegates; Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, 4; Primitive Methodist Church in Canada and United States, 2; Bible Christian Church in Canada, 2; British Methodist Episcopal Church in Canada, 2. From the British and Continental churches, the Wesleyan Methodists send 88 delegates; Primitive Methodists, 36; Free Church Methodists, 22; New Connection Methodists, 12; Bible Christians, 10; Wesleyan Reform Union, 4; Irish Wesleyans, 10; French Wesleyans, 2; and Australian Wesleyans, 10. The Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, except Japan and Italy, have no local representation, but most of them have delegates direct from their work. The Europeans and South African and Australian Missions of the Wesleyans are also represented.

The London Daily Telegraph says: "It is believed that six new peerages will shortly be announced. The Marquis of Tweeddale and Lord Reay will probably become English peers, and Sir Harcourt Johnstone and Sir Dudley Counts Marjoribanks be elevated to the Upper House."

These Imperial meetings are important events. When some Continental potentate remarked to Earl Beaconsfield that English diplomacy proceeded slowly, he said for a very good reason, there are thirty millions of sovereigns to be consulted about public affairs. In the German, Austrian and Russian Empires, and formerly in the French Empire, a few men do all the business. Put the three Chancellors and the three Emperors together in a room, and take into consideration the financial influences outside that can reach them, and you have the whole will of the three great Empires. When the new Czar and the old Kaiser meet they won't trouble themselves about the views of the 170 millions of people over whom they rule as obstacles in their way.

NEWS NOTES.

A congress of Socialists has been summoned to meet at Berne on the 23rd of October.
Butter factories are springing up on all sides in the Province of Quebec. This season alone some two hundred have been established.

A St. Petersburg despatch says a terrible fire is raging among the naphtha wells at Krasuitakoff, the flames leaping into the air from 100 to 120 feet. They have been raging for five days, and the loss will be enormous.

Mr. Blake cried out to the Maritime Province people that the N. P. made their blankets higher, and sympathized greatly with the fishermen and others. "The poor man's blanket" figured considerably in his augmentative lectures. The organ here says, "blankets now sell at lower prices than for some years back." The organ gives Mr. Blake away sadly.—Toronto Mail.

The return just issued shows that the payment of interest on the National Debt of Great Britain was last year £22,267,000, and the amount for redemption of debt £6,040,000. To this latter sum must also be added the excess of income over expenditure in the year amounting to £233,000, making the total reduction of debt, or increase of cash balances, so far as the operations of the public revenues and expenditures are concerned, equal to £8,973,000.

The forest fires in East Michigan seem to have been more fearful than were at first thought. The Huron Peninsula has been simply devastated, and it is calculated that at least one thousand lives have been lost. The injuries received by the survivors have been of a most terrible character, while \$500,000 will not cover the loss. Appeals for aid have been circulated all over the Union, and a public meeting for the same purpose has been held in Detroit. It appears that very many of the ruined settlers are Canadians. The fires in Canada are reported as still raging.

The laws of Roumania recognize the inherent right of married women to visit summer resorts. A court at Bucharest decided that the wife of General Cornesco should be allowed to visit certain springs, and authorized her to raise a loan of 2,000 francs for the expenses of the journey. The springs are medicinal, and she had the doctor's orders to go to them. The General thought that the doctor exaggerated her necessity, hence the action. The decision will probably do much for the fashionable physicians at Bucharest.

A substantial contribution to the coming centennial celebration at Yorktown is Mr. H. P. Johnston's volume, "The Yorktown Campaign," which Harper & Brothers will publish in a few days. The book is copiously illustrated with maps and fine engravings from famous historical paintings by Trumbull, Sir Joshua Reynolds, Gilbert Stuart, and others. It is no little compliment to Mr. Johnston's accuracy that he has been consulted in locating the camping grounds of the militia from the various States, which it is designed to make identical with the camping grounds of the troops from their respective States a century ago.

The Manitoba exhibit to be shown at Minneapolis and Rochester has left Winnipeg. It comprises thirty varieties of prairie grass, samples of wheat, oats and barley, in the straw, samples of threshed grain, potatoes, turnips, carrots, orange and white; cabbages, red and white; onions, several varieties; rhubarb, celery, citrons, melons, cucumbers, parsnips, beets, mangel wurtzel; beans, several varieties; cauliflower, corn, plum tomatoes, tomatoes, red; egg plant, peppers, kohlrabi, a beautiful sample of wild hops; herbs and other articles. Notwithstanding the season, owing to its dryness having been rather unfavorable to the growth of roots and vegetables, the display is a very fine one.

A curious will case has just been decided in Dublin. Miss Newport, of that city, died last January very wealthy, left all her money to charitable institutions. The will was contested on the ground of insanity. One proof of her madness was her fondness for cats and her treatment of colony of those animals which she kept on her premises. One of her habits was to assemble the Feline crowd in the garden and engage them in controversial exercises. They were so many that she could not tell without reference to a memorandum-book how large their number was. Her ambition was to have a cat for every day in the week, including Sundays. She used to be much distressed because of the scampish conduct of some of the cats, which remained out at nights, and were otherwise irregular in their habits. At the controversial meetings she would assemble as many as were at home and could be induced to attend in the garden, and there read portions of Scripture to their wicked course of life." She said from their wicked course of life." She started controversial points for their instruction and dismissed them with prayer. She was so thoroughly identified with her cats that it was her delight to go about the room on all fours mewing for milk. Once, when found parring under the piano and remonstrated with, she put up her back and spat at the intruder like a venetian lady in a temper. There was evidence to show that after this she put off the cat went out dressed like a lady, and overhauled her butchers bill. But the jury could not get over the garden scenes with the cats of irregular habits, and so they found that Miss Newport was mad when she made her will, and the eleven poor relations have divided her money between them.
