Cricket.

In this morning's *Patriot* there appears an account of a cricket match, played on Saturday between "Natives" and "Foreigners," which is characterized as the rubber match between the two Elevens. This is not in any way correct, and the foreigner who put such a statement in print must have a very lively imagination indeed. The first two matches were won by the "Natives," as the published scores can testify. In the first, after a pretty close and well-contested match, the "Natives" were the victors; and in the second the foreign individuals were shamefully beaten. Consequently it was no rubber match at all, and on Saturday five or six of the Native Eleven were unable to play, thus making it more of a scratch match than anything else; but there can be no doubt, from the scores, that had the "Natives" their proper eleven on the field, including Messrs. F. Longworth, W. Hobkirk, S. Fitzgerald and V. Longworth, quite a different complexion would be put on the game. It would be well for the future, in publishing reports of matches, that the correct version should find its way into the papers. One-sided statements look very mean and don't advance the cause of cricket.—COM.

**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

GLASGOW, Aug. 30.  
The iron masters of West Scotland have agreed to notify their employers of a reduction of 10 per cent. in wages.

DUBLIN, Aug. 30.  
John Eugene O'Kavanagh, the well-known Celtic scholar, and formerly a prominent leader in Irish politics, is dead.

LONDON, Aug. 30.  
The *Times*' leader, criticising the article of Mr. Gladstone's bitterly attacking the Conservative policy, says: "The country will be as little stirred by this new attack as it has been by numerous attacks in and out of Parliament, on paper and by word of mouth, which Gladstone has been pouring out for a good many months. He really ought, as a man of sense, to accept the fact that judgment has been given against him. There is, as the wise men tell us, 'A time to speak, and a time to remain silent.' When the party leader has said all he has to say, and in spite of frequent repetition, has found he has not convinced his countrymen, it might be well for him at length to remember the second clause of the advice and wait either for new matter or for a more auspicious opportunity."

LONDON, Aug. 30.  
Mr. Welsh, the American Minister, writes, under date of August 8th, reminding Lord Salisbury that the former appeals for the release of the Fenian, Condon, have been refused, but since then the action of the British Government has brought it so much honor that he (Welsh) thought the moment might possibly be a particularly agreeable one for the exercise of clemency, especially in answer to the prayer of a friendly government which has shown so deep an interest in the case as to have already preferred the prayers three times, and would doubtless continue to do so, but will always most respectfully await until it is granted. The belief in the United States is that Condon is an ardent Irishman who served most honorably in the American war, was a victim of circumstances in his wrong doing, and having been eleven years in prison and learned wisdom, may well be restored to his family in the United States. Under date of August 16th, Lord Salisbury replies that the Cabinet will recommend the remission of his sentence.

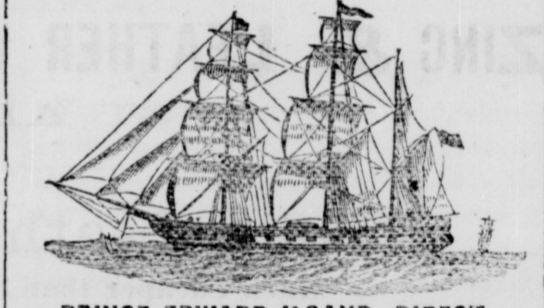
