NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

GRAND FALLS, N. B., May 26. This morning about eight o'clock six men on Hays's drive were drowned about half a mile below here. They were in a boat which struck a rock and sunk. A horse also was drowned. The names of the men have not yet been learned.

LATER. It is uncertain whether there were four or six men drowned. At the time the boat sank there were on board thirteen men and four horses. The names of the men are: James Crowley, John Lipssett, Butterflur and Lapointe. One of the bodies has been recovered.

BROOKLYN, May 26. The oil works of Bush & Deslaur, at the foot of Twenty-fifth street, were burned this morning. The fire was ushered in by a tremendous explosion. The shipping along the river front took fire and the conflagration, which extended nearly half a mile, was the most brilliant ever witnessed here. The lumber yard of Willard & Co. was also burned, together with a small steamer and schooner. The total loss is \$300,000. The watchman was burned to death.

NEW YORK, May 26. The heat is again excessive. The thermometer at eleven was 89.

SANTA FE, May 26. It is stated that four more ranchmen have been killed near Tulerosa by Indians. It estimated that in Sorasco County and Magellan Mountains, 50 Mexican herders and 5 Americans, including two women, have been massacred. The number killed since the 1st of May is said to be 78. Several settlements will no doubt have to be abandoned.

LONDON, May 26. The Post states that Sir Henry Wolff, Mr. Fowler and Mr. O'Donnell have received anonymous letters from persons threatening to murder them for opposing the admission of Charles Bradlaugh in the House.

The Derby race came off 20 minutes late. All routes to Epsom were crowded during the morning and there were the usual scenes of Derby day on the road. Bender and Robert the Devil maintained their respective places in the betting up to the time of the start. During the morning a sensation was caused by some furze near Tattenham Corner catching fire, but the flames were speedily extinguished and did not interfere with the racing. The Prince and Princess of Wales, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, Duke of Edinburgh, Cambridge and Mecklenburg, and other prominent people, were present.

PARIS, May 26. Late on Monday night, Jules Simon, on learning that Say had been adopted as the candidate of the Left, declared that he positively refused to stand against him. The leaders of various groups of the Right thereupon decided to deposit blank voting papers. Dr. Freycinet attended the Senate on purpose to show that he cordially deferred to the will of the Left. Some say that the rumor that Waddington will succeed Say as ambassador to London is at present imaginary, Waddington having firmly refused the post a few months ago and is not likely to have changed his mind. A later account understands that Waddington has accepted the London embassy.

ROME, May 26. Returns from all constituencies except one have been received. The Government has 263 votes against 149 of the Right and 90 of the dissident Left. The election in five constituencies has not been proclaimed. This leaves the ministers a bare majority of 24. It appears evident that the leaders of the Oppositions have determined to provoke another crisis as quickly as possible.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 25. Intelligence has been received from Tchi-kistar that General Skobloff has arrived there and found the Russian troops gone. He intends to make early advances.

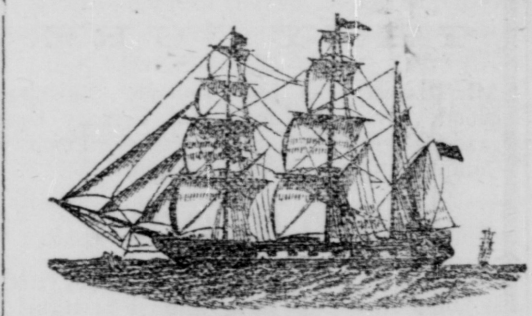
