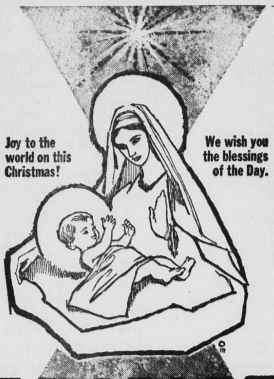


Whim Road Lady Dies In 86th Year

Shaw Pleased With Grant To Creamery

Premier Walter R. Shaw has expressed pleasure with the announcement that the federal government has granted \$60,000 to the Morell Creamery Co-operative Association to assist in the construction of their new cheese factory. "My government," he said, "has been active since the day fire destroyed the Morell creamery to get assistance for the rebuilding. We immediately got in touch with Ottawa through our resources development program for assistance." Premier Shaw said "we felt that the Morell group was entitled to assistance and two of my ministers, Hon. Andrew MacEneaney and Hon. Leo Royster, followed the matter through, and I am pleased that assistance has been granted."

FERRIES BACK ON SCHEDULE

CNR ferries were back on schedule yesterday after a hectic two days when stormy weather and severe ice conditions prevented loading and unloading the lower decks. The biggest problem was with ice conditions on the loading ramps both at Borden and Cape Tormentine. Crews worked around the clock to clear the ice and the first vehicles used the ramps around noon on Saturday. Train No. 38 from Charlottetown to Borden broke down for several hours at Royalty Junction Saturday but the ferry Abegweit waited until it reached Borden before making her 10 o'clock sailing—four hours behind schedule. Extra freight trains were running throughout the province yesterday in an effort to clear the tie up of mail and express as the result of the ferry and train hold up yesterday, Friday and Saturday. Buses also reported a tremendous volume of express.

Riots Flare In Nicosia

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)— Blood flowed on Nicosia streets Saturday in the most serious display of animosity between Greek and Turkish Cypriots since Britain freed this Mediterranean island on Aug. 16, 1960. Two Turkish Cypriots were shot dead and nine persons—five of Turkish and two of Greek blood—were wounded in two affairs that followed weeks of tension over proposed changes in the country's constitution.
