Mr. B. I. Rayner of Summerside was elected president of the Prince County branch of the Fish and Game Association and Mr. Norman MacLeod re-elected secretary. The annual meeting of the association was held at the Prince County branch of the R.C.A.F. Station branch which is affiliated with the Prince County organization. Mr. MacLeod said the membership objective for 1955 is 500 members and asked the continued support of all members in making this membership drive a success. He said the branch had gone to considerable expense during the past winter in feeding upland birds and he thanked the farmers, school teachers and others who assisted in this project. The financial report was read by the secretary Mr. Norman MacLeod.

Alberton Men's Ass'n Holds Lobster Supper

Alberton United Church Men's Association held their monthly supper meeting in the church hall last evening. A delicious lobster supper was catered to by members of the association. Worship was led by Reginald Travers. Dr. O. H. Phillips presided during the business session during which various committee reports were received. The guest speaker, Cst. "Chuck" Walpur, was introduced by Rev. Murray Gardner. In his address Cst. Walpur of the Alberton detachment of R.C.M.P. gave a brief outline of the history of the force since its origin as the Royal North West Mounted Police in 1873, mentioning some of its more notable achievements. The main subject of his talk dealt with highway safety. There is now on the island a corporal six men, equipped with three radio cars and six motor cycles working full time on traffic patrol duties. A reduction in traffic deaths from 23 in 1951 and 25 in 1952 down to 12 in 1954 has resulted, he said, from road patrols and vehicle inspection. No deaths have occurred in highway accidents so far this year. After a number of questions in connection with highway traffic regulations, five educational films, "teenacide," "speed," "child safety," drinking and driving" and "night driving" were shown.

A blanket and flashlight were also stolen from the car of a neighbor right next door to the Flahaven home. Summerside police are investigating the thefts.
