SPECIAL CERTIFICATE
To qualify for a Canadian pilot certificate in these restricted waters, the navigator would have to have experience in them and a thorough local knowledge. This type of certificate would be designated an A certificate. The qualifications to obtain an A certificate would rule out masters and officers of ocean vessels.

In other waters, the Canadian proposal is that minimum requirements for a B certificate for open-water navigation would be that a crew member of the vessel be proficient enough in English to use a radio telephone, have a working knowledge of the Great Lakes rules of the road and hold a master or mate certificate issued by his vessel's home government.
