

New Industries Recommended

Economic Survey Completed In N.S.

NEW YORK (CP)—An economic survey of Nova Scotia, to be delivered to the provincial government this week, recommends the development of a number of new industries as one of the solutions to the province's lagging economy.

But not nearly as fast as other parts of Canada. Discussing wages in the province the survey says money paid to workers constitutes 97.8 per cent of the net value of iron and steel products while the same figure for Canada generally is only 55.1 per cent.

OTHER OPENINGS

The survey says there are also openings for these products to absorb surplus milk output, leather goods, synthetic yarns and fabrics, plywood, aircraft parts, storage batteries and electrical supplies.

Of existing industries, the survey proposes expansion of boatbuilding, plastic products, paper boxes and bags.

All these proposed industrial developments are contained in a priority list of what can be done to bolster the province's economy.

The survey Business Week says also recommends recognition of the department of trade and industry.

"More emphasis should be placed on research into specific areas, such as conservation of forests, mining rights, employment and income problems, and on promotion of industrial opportunities and tourist trade," the magazine says.

WANTS LOAN INCREASE

The survey urges improvement of the industrial loans board. It says the board should publicize its credit-extension service more widely and operate with a minimum of governmental interference.

It also proposed establishment of a business development corporation. The magazine describes Canada's spurt toward prosperity and says Nova Scotia has failed to keep pace.

It says there is a defeatist attitude among Nova Scotians which is a major cause for the lag. It finds Nova Scotia has been moving ahead since the Second World War.

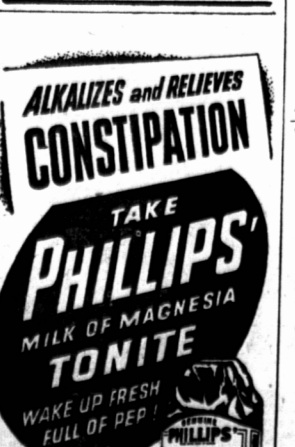

LOW LABOR COST

Discussing wages in the province the survey says money paid to workers constitutes 97.8 per cent of the net value of iron and steel products while the same figure for Canada generally is only 55.1 per cent.

At the same time, however, it notes that annual wages and salaries in Nova Scotian manufacturing are about \$410 lower than the Canadian average, a fact that should make the province attractive to a manufacturer seeking a readily available, reasonably-priced labor supply.

The business magazine notes the report "pretty well eliminates power-oriented industries, because power is costly and limited."

"Consequently," the magazine says, "the artificial-abrasives industry which requires cheap power is a poor bet for the province. However, plastics, where power costs are of secondary importance, is a likely possibility."

WILL GIVE HELP

D. Reid Weedon, vice-president of the company which made the survey, says in the report: "We don't mean to be their salesmen, but we'll help them get started."

As part of this plan, Little will help budget an industrial-development program, offer advice on plant location, and design promotional brochures.

During the Nova Scotian study, Little's staff personally interviewed businessmen and government officials, studied specific industries on the spot.
