WAR NEWS.

Special Dispatch to Examiner.

LONDON, March 11.

The Times' leading editorial article contends that Russia must submit every one of the peace conditions to the Congress, not excepting the indemnity clause. She has no right, says the article, to be dictator over Turkey. The great powers did not invite her to make war or give her commission to replace the government of the Porte in any way she may think fit. The Times also eulogizes the government's action in bringing forward the Greek claim. No decision, it says, so patriotic and farseeing has been taken by the Cabinet in many a day as the steps proposing that Greece should be represented at the conference. It recognizes that the old state of things cannot be restored and that the best materials for replacing it are being in the Hellenic race.

BERLIN, March 11.

Prince Bismarck will go to his Lanenburg estates for the improvement of his health, and will remain there until the meeting of Congress.

Count Andrassy has made a further statement in various committees of delegations, explaining that the declaration of Austro-Hungary interests was handed to Russia before the war, and Russia acknowledged that it was well founded. He emphatically denied that the Government contemplated ordering a mobilization as soon as the credit was noted. The Government desired to be provided with means, showing that the monarchy is capable of protecting its interests; but they could not take the responsibility of appearing at great cost in a state of military preparation before the Congress, from whose deliberations a satisfactory understanding was anticipated. He denied various reports that actual measures for mobilization had been taken, or that an ordre de bataille was already drawn up. It is asserted that Count Andrassy, in his address before a sub-committee of the Herzegovina delegation on Sunday, stigmatized the policy of Servia as aiming at aggrandizement and jeopardizing the interests of Austria and Hungary.

LONDON, March 11.

In the House of Lords to-night Earl Derby, replying to Lord Strathenden, said that the question whether the Congress would have full material to form judgment on all questions to be submitted was undoubtedly of great importance. He considered it useless and foolish to go into the Congress unless it had real not merely nominal power of dealing with matters before it. Her Majesty's government is now in communication with other governments on this subject.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 11.

The Czar is expected to ratify the treaty on Saturday or Sunday.

The Grand Duke Nicholas has telegraphed to the Czar that he will return to St. Petersburg immediately after he has visited the Sultan.

The Czar replied, desiring him to remain.

The Porte has appointed M. Kerassandjian as political agent in attendance upon the Grand Duke.

OUR OTTAWA DESPATCH.

(Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.)

OTTAWA, March 11.

Pope, in moving for the returns of the Engineers respecting Victoria Breakwater, pressed for a grant to finish the work and afford accommodation to farmers, besides creating a profitable intercolonial trade.

At that point he charged the Government with neglect of Island interests with surrendering twenty thousand dollars at Souris.

McKenzie objected to reference to Souris Breakwater.

Tipper defended Pope, showing that the Island interests generally had been neglected, and that Pope was contending for a grant on that account.

Pope went on to show that there had been gross mismanagement, and that this year the estimates did not give justice to the Island. He charged Sinclair with neglect.

Sinclair said the Government promised to send the dredge to Victoria next summer. He hoped the Government would give a grant for the Breakwater.

Davies thought that, owing to the shifting of the sands, it was no use to dredge until the Breakwater was built. He hoped the Government would grant a few thousand dollars to finish the works.

As our short notice of this judgment yesterday was hurriedly written, we may add that, as to the liability of persons to be rated under "The Public Schools Act," for land in a School District in which the person owning the land does not reside. The decision is that there is no liability under the Statute, unless such person carries on business in the District in which he is a non-resident, and in that case he is liable to pay assessment for the School in the District where the land lies. Residents of a School District are only liable to be rated in support of the School in such District for the land held by them within the limits of the School District where they reside, and not elsewhere.

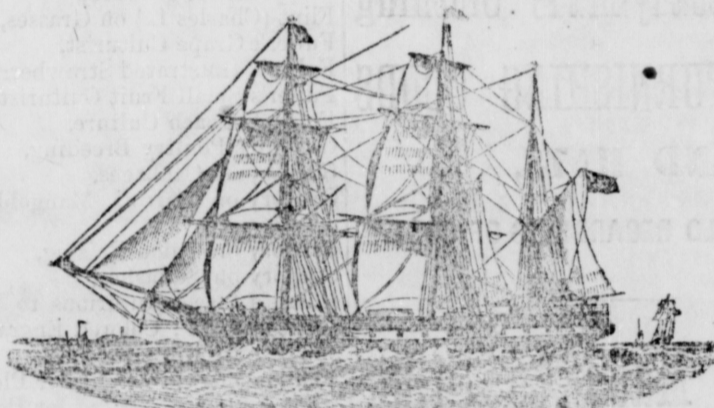
