RESCUE BIDS

In the early days of contract, rescue bids somehow or other acquired a bad name—but this type is not nearly so black as it is painted! Observe this deal:

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

♠ J 10 8 6 2	♥ Q 8	♦ J 10 7 3	♣ A 9 5
♠ K 7 5	♥ J 10 8	♦ K 9 6 4	♣ J 7 3
♠ A 4 3	♥ A 9 2	♦ A 8 5	♣ 10 8 6 2

The bidding:
South West North East
1♣ Pass 1♠ Pass
1NT Pass Pass Dble.
Pass Pass Pass

South was not in a very comfortable contract—one trump double led—and when the smoke of battle had cleared, he was down 1100 points, having taken nothing but his own three aces against the "murderously" perfect defense. West opened the heart jack—not a diamond—and South was helpless.

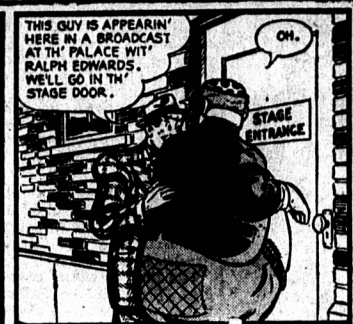
In view of the weakness of the North hand, and in further view of South's lack of winners or "intermediates," it was inevitable that the partnership should suffer some loss on the deal, but, there was certainly no reason to take a loss of 1100 points! North was too passive—or perhaps too defeatist.

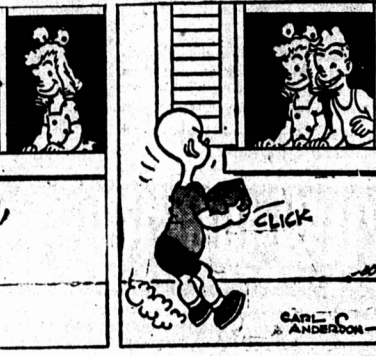
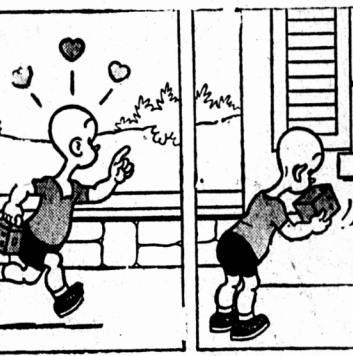
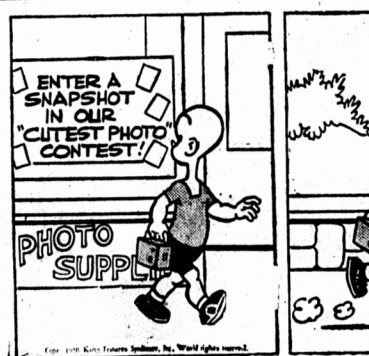
