## Local and Other Items.

OPERA HOUSE.—Mr. Vinnicombe will give two violin solos at the concert in the Opera House to-night. The programme is one that should draw a large house.

WATER SUPPLIED.—The water pipe at the foot of Euston Street was accidentally broken yesterday and the water shut off from the houses in the vicinity. Mr. Dalziel thoughtfully sent the city water-cart around and supplied these houses with sufficient water for culinary purposes.

RAILWAY PICNIC.—There was a large attendance at the railway picnic at Midgell yesterday, and all had a good time. Thirteen well-filled cars left Charlottetown at eight o'clock in the morning and returned about half past eight in the evening. There was a band of music in attendance. The weather was fine throughout.

CHEESE MAKING.—The Hazellrock factory is now receiving daily between 12,000 and 13,000 pounds of milk, the supply on Monday's being about 21,000 pounds. On Monday's 28 cheese are made, the number made on other days being 17. The greatest number of cheese made by this factory any day this year was on a Monday near the middle of July when 21 were put up, the amount of milk received being 23,500 pounds. All this year's cheese is sold excepting the make of the last two weeks of August and for this they on Friday last refused an offer of 11 3/8.

FIRST METHODIST CHURCH.—The morning service last Sunday at the First Methodist church was played by Mr. Vernon Eville, organist of Christ Church, Windsor, N. S. His volunaries were excellently played, displayed both judgment and cultured taste in his registration. His accompaniments were all that could be desired. He also assisted the organist by playing part of the evening service. The huge church was comfortably filled. The evening anthems were "All hail the power to Elms," (by request) and the Gloria from the 12th Mass. Mr. Eville deepened the favorable impression made by him at the morning service.
