Welsh Mining Fatality.

Immigration to Canada.

LONDON, April 13. Up to 2 o'clock this morning, fifty-three corpses were taken from the Pontypridd pit. The searching parties have found no signs of any missing miners alive. The British Board of Trade returns show that the emigration from British ports to the Dominion ports has just been doubled in the first quarter, as compared with the same period of the previous year.

AN OPPOSITION VICTORY.

THE CAUSE.

RIQUAD, Que., April 13. The Tarte McCarthy Alliance has won a victory in Vaudreuil, where Henry Harwood was yesterday elected by a majority of 125 over Mr. Chevrier the Government candidate. The Manitoba School Question does not seem to have generally affected the result, the Opposition victory being brought about by the weakness of the Government candidate and the late hour at which he was in the field.

OTTAWA, April 13. Hon. Peter Mitchell was relieved of \$120 while on the train going to New York yesterday.

General Telegraphic News.

MADRID, April 11.—Much excitement has been caused by a despatch stating that Japan has seized the Pelew Islands in the North Pacific Ocean, which had been claimed by Spain by right of discovery. The islands have 10,000 inhabitants and are very fertile.

MOSCOW, April 11.—The famine in the European part of the government of Perm is worse than ever before. The poor are dying by hundreds in the smaller villages. The people have ceased trying to bury all the bodies. Relatives of the dead are often too weak to provide burial for the corpses, and so leave them lying on the roofs of the houses. It is estimated 252,000,000 bushels of grain will be required to alleviate the distress and keep the peasants in food until next harvest.

TORONTO, April 11.—A lively meeting of temperance M. P. P's and leading men took place to-night. After a stormy discussion the meeting approved of a plebiscite to be taken in the Ontario general election of 1894, and also of Mr. Martineau's measure before the legislature forbidding the retailing of liquor in Ontario.

LONDON, April 11.—A frightful accident occurred to-day in Wales. A spark from the engine ignited the gas in a coal pit near Pontypridd causing an explosion. The exact number of lives lost is not known. Three hundred miners are entombed. The engine house is in flames. It is feared most of the miners perished. Rescuers who went down were driven back without being able to bring up more than five of the dead. Later advices say the pit is worked in sections, one seam being above another. The fire resulting from the explosion broke out in the eastern section. From this section twenty-seven men succeeded in reaching the surface through the main dip working, forcing their way through fire and smoke, many being scorched and all exhausted. They expressed the fear that all those left behind in the mine had perished.
