Our fishermen think it unjust that Canadians are permitted to send fish in bond to Portland, Boston and New York, for which places it is shipped to the Windward Islands, Bermuda, and other places, whilst our vessels are not permitted to land at colonial ports and have their cargoes sent forward in bond to the United States.

A Seditious Meeting.

DUBLIN, July 23. The citizens of Waterford held a meeting to take steps to compel the corporation to remove the royal portraits from the Council Chamber, and to hang therein a portrait of General Meagher, who was convicted of sedition and sentenced to death for participating in the rebellion of 1848.

The Savings' Bank Returns.

OTTAWA, July 23. The Savings' Bank returns for the fiscal year ended 30th June, represent the amount to credit of depositors at the end of the year as \$17,159,372, including interest. This is the largest sum ever on deposit since the establishment of the system in 1869.

A Grand Pow-Wow.

WINNIPEG, Man., July 23. Sir John A. Macdonald held a pow-wow with Crowfoot and other Indian chiefs at Gliechen. Crowfoot complained of several matters which the Premier promised to right. Yesterday Sir John was at Calgary.

Fell from Aloft.

NORTH SIDNEY, C. B., July 23. A seaman named John Sheehan, belonging to the barkentine Retriever, fell from aloft to-day, and struck on a belaying pin. His brains were dashed out, and he died immediately.

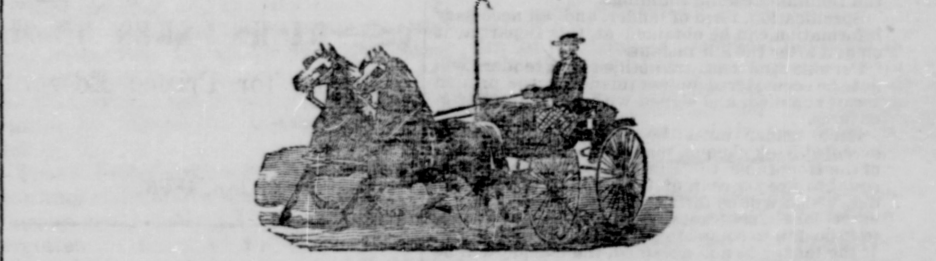
