

# Eskimos Arrive To Act As Crew

ALBERTON — Adam Adams and David Pinguayak, who arrived in Alberton Monday night, are believed to be the first Eskimos ever to visit the town if not the first in the province.

The two young men, who have completed a vocational training course in mechanics at Yellowknife in the Northwest Territories, will crew members on board two logliners built by Alberton Industries for service in the far north.

Chees Russell, technical officer with the department of northern affairs, who also arrived Monday, will be in charge and act as pilot on the 2,300 mile cruise.

Mrs. Leo Rossiter, wife of the Prince Edward Island fisheries and industries minister, and Mrs. Watson MacNaught, wife of the federal solicitor-general, are also on the two logliners, which will leave for the west coast Sunday.

The two vessels were completed by the Alberton plant and launched several weeks ago. The "Arctic" is a 40-foot (White Whale) and the 40-foot "Nassiq" will sail from Alberton Sunday for their home port.

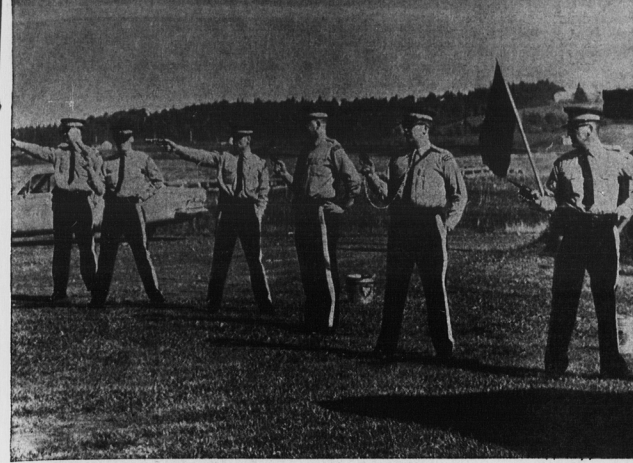
The "Qilalugaa" will operate in the Keewatin district on the west side of Hudson Bay about 330 miles north of Port Churchill. The "Nassiq" will be based at the town of Inuvik on the northern tip of Labrador at Port Baruel.

Besides seal, walrus, codfish and Arctic char hunting, the sturdy built craft will be used for administrative work by northern officials, for sick calls, evacuation of Eskimos and general work of improving the economy of Eskimo people.

Mr. Russell expected the cruise to take about 50 days depending on weather conditions. The larger vessel is powered by an 85 hp diesel while the other has a 65 hp motor. Contract for the boats amounted to slightly over \$25,000.

They will follow the coast line, pass through the Strait of Belle Isle along the Labrador coast into Hudson Bay.

Mr. Russell, a native of New Brunswick who now makes his home in Ottawa, said he was highly pleased with the two boats and hoped he would be back more in the future.
