GREAT BRITAIN'S NAVY.

Four Additional First-class Ships to be Built.

LONDON, July 28.—In the House of Commons last evening, Mr. Goschen, First Lord of the Admiralty, announced supplementary naval estimates to the amount of £5,000,000, which he said was necessitated by the rapid additions to foreign navies. It is proposed to utilize the amount mentioned in the immediate commencement of the construction of four additional fast armored cruisers of 11,850 tons, each capable of the double duty of taking part in action with battleships and protecting lines of communication. In addition to these, sixty thousand pounds will be spent on new torpedo boat destroyers.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

MARIETTA, Ohio, July 26.—As an excursion train was returning from Zanesville, Ohio, at 9.50 last night, the trestlework over a bottom land, three and a half miles from Marietta, gave way, and two of the four coaches were dropped to a corn-field below. The coaches were filled with excursionists, but no one was killed. Fifteen persons were badly injured, and all were more or less bruised. Miss Nellie Purdy will probably die. One of the coaches took fire and some of the passengers were singed before they could escape.

LONDON, July 26.—The Agricultural Gazette recently sent out a circular asking information on the subject of crop prospects. The circular elicited 738 replies, the substance of which shows that the wheat crop for the United Kingdom is much below the average. Barley is up to the average; oats and potatoes are slightly below it and hay in most districts is considerably above it.

WASHINGTON, July 27.—A report is in circulation which is apparently inspired by a belief which prevails in diplomatic official circles, that John Sherman, Secretary of State, may not much longer remain at the head of the State Department. It is to the effect that Mr. White-law Reid will succeed him. Mr. Sherman's friends deny that he is to surrender the control of the affairs of the State Department, and say that he will return to the city in a month to resume his official duties. The report connecting Reid's name with the succession is seized upon as indicating the desire of Mr. Sherman's family and friends that he retire from active life.

MONTREAL, July 26.—Dr. Duncan MacEachern, Dominion Veterinary Inspector, who has returned from a trip of inspection to the Northwest, says: "The demand for beef cattle for mining districts has opened up the best markets the ranchmen have had for years. Nearly all saleable cattle are disposed of to the contractors for Rossland and other camps. There is now a good demand for cattle for the Klondike country, and as a consequence the export to Europe is greatly decreased. Fort McLeod is thronged with men trying for work on the Crow's Nest Pass railway."

YUKON POLICE AND CUSTOMS.

Measures to Enforce Law and Order and Collect Duties in the New Gold Fields

OTTAWA, July 27.—A special session of the Cabinet was held last night to deal with questions affecting the government of the Yukon district, the collection of revenues therein and the establishment of competent authority to enforce law and order in the new gold fields. The arrangement entered into with the United States treasury department by the Minister of Customs was approved. This plan, as stated, provides for the establishment of a customs port and a police station at Lake Tagish, the confluence of British territory of the two principal trails leading from the Tyes inlet, the privilege having been accorded of a landing place at Tyes on the Lynn canal. The additional police will consist of a detachment of 86 men, making with the 20 already in, a force of 106 men. A new post is now being constructed at Dawson City. The ministers decided to open up correspondence with Washington for the purpose of securing the consent of the United States government to the utilization of a right of way for the transport of dominion forces and supplies through the disputed territory between tidewater and the interior. The matter of imposing a royalty upon the output of the placer mines was left over to a final cabinet meeting to-morrow morning. But it was definitely decided not to entertain the proposition to enforce or endeavor to enforce the new alien labor law in the Klondike country.

PORT TOWNSHEND, Wash., July 26.—The steamer City of Topeka arrived here from Alaska today. She brings news that the Klondike fever is on the increase at Juneau, nearly every able-bodied man there either having gone or prepared to go to the rich fields. Authentic reports direct from the Dyecha are that there is as much freight piled up at the head of the inlet as the Indians can pack over the divide in the next eighteen months. This amount of freight will be more than double when the steamers Queen and Mexico, now en route, arrive. This condition of affairs practically precludes the possibility of hundreds of gold-seekers reaching the mining region this year. John C. Brady has taken his oath of office, and is now Alaskan governor.

At San Luis Potosi, Mexico, on the 13th inst., Miss C. M. Trueman, in the 72nd year of her age. The deceased lady was a sister of the late Mrs. Charles F. Allison, of Mt. Allison, Sackville, and of Mrs. R. A. Strong, formerly of Charlottetown, with whom she resided at the time of her death.
