

Anglican Comm Commences Coast-To-Coast Tour Here

Rev. Canon A. J. Jackson, M.A., president of the Anglican Communion, arrived in Toronto today as the first of a coast-to-coast tour of Canada. He is the first of a series of speakers at the annual meeting of the Anglican Church of Canada which is being held in Toronto on Sunday evening.

In a two-fold appeal for people to meet the speaker, the Rev. Canon said that the changes which are taking place in Canada, Canon Jackson said, are a challenge to the church.

Stressing the expanding need for the church in Canada, Canon Jackson urged young men of character who feel the call to the ministry, not to set aside through a lack of confidence in their own ability to accept it in humility and conviction.

The Christian faith is a gift, Canon Jackson said.

\$20,000, a percentage providing \$4,000 from 40,000 feet of ten cents per foot. This would be a tax on lots on which there are no houses.

On the other side of the sheet the estimated costs to the Parkdale people under amalgamation included real and personal property \$41,875, to be raised by a tax rate of 2.75 percent on an assessment of \$1,500,000.

There was \$5,000 for education, \$2,000 for the fire department, an item of \$24,000 assessed on Parkdale property.

This refers to the grant of \$45,000 per year to the city. The province has agreed to pay the tax of \$7,000 and an item of \$7,750 for 125 people paying taxes of \$30 each.

There was considerable controversy over the validity of some of the items. Speaking for the Commissioners, Alex MacLean stated that the items were properly assessed. He said, for example, that the cost estimate of \$24,000, share of special grant, was a proper item because in effect "the City is trying to trade for some of the services we get for nothing from the provincial government now." He instanced the policing, maintenance of streets and the cost of snow removal and other things.

However, Art Love insisted that the \$24,000 was a proper item of cost against the villagers. He will be getting the same services from the City, if amalgamated. That item should not be there at all, he insisted.

Mr. Love also stated that other items concerning water rates and per capita grants did not belong there as they did not in fact constitute a charge against the people of Parkdale. The correct figure with these deletions, he said, would be \$22,000 under amalgamation for 1958.

He said they should also leave the estimated cost for 1958 as a separate village at some \$20,000. This would be more than twenty thousand in excess of the amalgamated cost, he suggested.

Commissioner MacLean, however, said he could not follow Mr. Love's reasoning.

On the same sheet of paper cost estimates for 1962 under amalgamation and as a separate unit. These were \$122,900 under amalgamation and \$75,400 as a separate unit.

Again Mr. Love challenged the validity of the reasoning. He said for example, that the estimate showed the assessment on real property doubled. This is not right, he said. The general impression was that the assessment would probably be increased by fifty per cent, he said. Studies we have made indicate the assessment will be at least 40 per cent under the City, Mr. MacLean insisted.

Mr. Love also questioned the cost estimates.
