EUROPEAN SHORT-WAVE RECEPTION

For the first time, by short-wave radio, we can actually hear European war news broadcast from their sources. It is a popular fallacy that one must sit up late at night to hear short-wave or must have a specially built "tailor made" set. There is hardly a period day or night, atmospheric conditions permitting (and they have been very good of late) that it is not possible, with any modern first-class standard radio receiver, to pick up a war news bulletin direct from London, Berlin or Paris.
 Short-wave broadcasting is confined to four principal narrow bands located approximately at 16, 19, 25, 31 and 49 meters. In the eastern part of the United States at this season of the year, for example, the 16 meter band is best in the early morning, the 19 meter from noon to early evening, and the 25, 31 and 49 meter later. This may vary somewhat in different parts of the country. One thing to remember, wherever you are, is to turn on plenty of volume and to tune slowly. The more carefully you go over the dial, the more likely you are to get the best results. Sometimes you have only to touch the knob to bring in a station.

SILVER FOXES RISE 15%.—A general advance of 15 per cent on silver fox skins featured the conclusion of the sale conducted on Tuesday by the New York Auction Company. The total proceeds of the sale of 12,000 skins was \$430,000, with buyers taking 97 per cent of the offerings. Auction company officials said this was the highest percentage taken by buyers in recent sales. Following the advance in full silvers on Monday, day sold up to \$52, half silvers to \$30 and one-quarter grades to \$25. Attendance at the sale was heavy. Price advances on other furs continued in the open market, necessitating increases on finished garments. Manufacturers however, have reported price resistance from buyers.

Dean Armitage Wycliffe Head
