

SDU Convocation Exercises Scheduled Monday Afternoon

Two honorary degrees and about 75 other degrees will be conferred by St. Dunstan's University at the annual convocation exercises to be held at 3:00 p.m. on Monday in the SDU Alumni auditorium.

Receiving honorary degrees will be the Hon. W.J. MacDonald, ED, BA, lieutenant-governor of Prince Edward Island, and Canon E.M. Malone, MA, DD, former canon of St. Peter's Anglican Cathedral, Charlottetown. Lieutenant-Governor MacDonald will also address the graduates.

Final figures of those receiving degrees will not be announced until Monday, but it is expected that more than 50 will receive Bachelor of Arts degrees, eight Bachelor of Science degrees, nine Bachelor of Commerce degrees, and two Bachelor of Education degrees.

It is also expected that nine Diplomas in Engineering will be granted.

The graduating class will attend a Pontifical Mass in the SDU chapel tomorrow at 4 p.m. during which the Baccalaureate

Sermon will be delivered by Rev. Dr. Clark McAulay, C.S.S.R., of Quebec City.

The honorary degree recipients are both well known locally. Lieutenant-Governor MacDonald is a noted sportsman, soldier and teacher. He served in both world wars and was wounded in France in 1918. He taught for many years at Prince of Wales College before his appointment as Lieutenant-Governor of P.E.I. in 1963.

Canon Malone was ordained in 1906 and began his ministry in Charlottetown in 1921. After he was made a canon of St. Peter's Cathedral in 1926, he served in this capacity for 26 years. He retired in 1952 and now acts as honorary assistant priest at the cathedral.

The convocation exercises on Monday are open to the public.

Heatherdale Resident Heads Breeders Club

MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN—George Matheson, Heatherdale, was appointed president of the Montague and District Artificial Breeding Club at the annual meeting held Thursday night at Montague. D. MacLeod was re-appointed secretary with the new directors as Alex Martin, Dingwell Herring and Howard MacLeod.

In the annual report it was noted that 2,050 cows had been bred artificially and the club had a membership of 253.

During the business session, members expressed their appreciation for the work done by the inseminator Lloyd MacKinnon. And on motion it was decided to increase his commission by \$100 per year and also to pay Mrs. MacKinnon the same amount for her assistance. It was unanimously passed.

Dr. H. Kelly was present and answered many questions from the breeders with sire election perhaps taking up the greater part of the meeting. Dr. Kelly pointed out some of the problems of the sire selection committee. He also advised that a more efficient method of handling the semen was in operation due to closer inspection and testing. He also noted that it took several years to produce proven sires. He cautioned the breeders not to put all their eggs in one basket, saying they should be using more than one bull.

Dave Peacock also addressed the meeting and advised the members of the necessity for treatment for warble fly control and their close check of all animals at this time. Speaking of the herd improvement plan, he advised that production had jumped from 7,000 lbs to 9,000 lbs per animal and this was indeed fruitful. He strongly urged the farmers not to use cross breeding. A cow should be bred to her
