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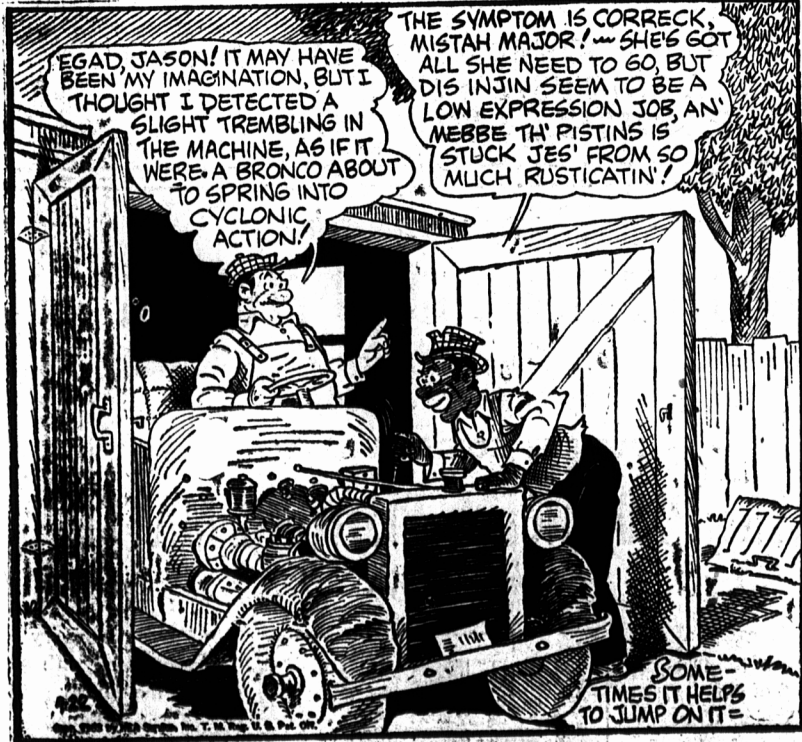

## California Girl Sets New Swimming Record

GIBRALTAR, (AP)—Florence Chadwick swam the straits of Gibraltar from Europe to Africa Sunday in five hours and six minutes, breaking all records.

Experts who had expressed doubt that the 33-year-old San Diego, Calif., swimmer could make the difficult eight-mile crossing, immediately dubbed her "The Iron woman of Gibraltar."

She beat the previous record held by a man by one hour and 53 minutes. Jorge Soguer of Argentina had made the crossing in six hours and 59 minutes in 1950.

Florence, the only woman to swim the English Channel both ways, said as she emerged from the surf on the northernmost point of Spanish Morocco: "I am the happiest girl in the world. I said I would do it and I did."

The first woman conqueror of Gibraltar's tough currents was Mercedes Gleitz of Britain who made it in 1928 in 13 hours and 42 minutes.

Florence entered the water in bright sunshine. The water temperature was 68 degrees. She took off from Punta Marconi, Spain's southernmost point. The British launch Firefly accompanied her on the crossing.

Miss Chadwick swam like an iron woman but when she got there she was violently sea sick for about five minutes. When she got aboard a launch to return after 30 seconds on African soil, a doctor examined her, exclaiming "this is not a woman, this is a titan. Her pulse, respiration and blood pressure are completely normal."

She swam the same breast-stroke at 30 strokes per minute all the way across. She aimed for Punta Cires but landed half a mile away after miles with all the zigzags. She took nourishment three times. She had broth and vitamins after two hours, chicken half an hour later, and crackers at four hours.

OKLAHOMA CITY, (AP)—Gene Alec Littler, 23, a tactician navy airman from La Jolla, Calif., who never had a golf lesson in his life, won the 53rd national amateur championship Saturday by sinking an 18-foot birdie putt on the final green for a 1-up victory over Dale Morey of Indianapolis. Apparently hopelessly beaten after his game had collapsed on the first nine holes of the afternoon round, Morey rallied for a finish that almost overtook the highly favored youngster from the West Coast.

Three down with nine to go. Morey, a 32-year-old sandpaper salesman, picked up on the 28th where Littler twice banged into the rough for a six and then he canned birdie putts of five and 10 feet on the 16th and 17th greens to send the grim duel to its final hole.

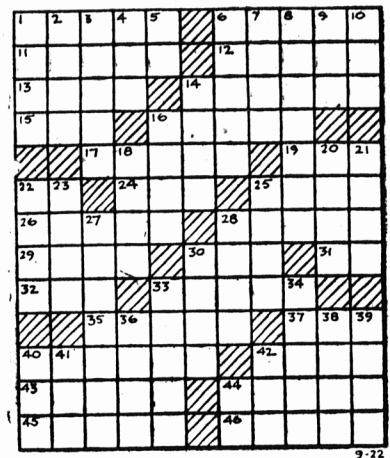
