Canada Is Planning To Assist Tanzania

OTTAWA (CP) — Canada is going to help the African Commonwealth country of Tanzania in an air force equipment and training program. External Affairs Minister Paul Martin announced Tuesday in the Commons. A Canadian survey team will be sent in a fortnight to Tanzania and the detailed program to be agreed between the two governments will be based on the team's findings, he said in a reply to Social Credit Leader Robert Thompson. It was learned that the air program may involve a financial contribution by Canada in the order of \$9,000,000 over the next five years. This would be in addition to the military program now under way which

is expected to cost some \$4,500,000 over a similar period. Justice Minister Guy Favreau said that various police forces are continuing their hunt for fugitive Lucien Rivard "with intensity." He told Creditiste Leader Real Caouette, however, that he has not communicated recently with Quebec Attorney-General Claude Wagner in connection with the search. A slip of the tongue caused External Affairs Minister Paul Martin to refer to the "honorable Member for Reindeer." He meant to say "red Deer," the Alberta riding of Social Credit Leader Robert Thompson. Mr. Martin blamed the slip on his recent bout with influenza.

The government has not yet considered whether it will receive in the new session a committee's study of the federal maritime union trustees, Labor Minister MacEachen said. Michael Starr (PC—Ontario) and Erik Nielsen (PC—Yukon) had pressed for revival of the committee.

Transport Minister J. W. Pickersgill said his department's study of the shipbuilding subsidy program still is under way and the freeze on new subsidies cannot yet be lifted. He was replying to Leon O'FINN (PC—Trois-Rivieres). Prime Minister Pearson said he will look into the question of assistance for maple syrup producers in Quebec, facing a reduced yield for the second year in a row. Raymond Langlois (Creditiste-Megantic) made the suggestion.

Suggests RCMP Be Turned Loose On Rivard Affair

QUEBEC (CP)—Ross Drouin, Conservative party counsel, suggested Tuesday that RCMP investigators be turned loose unmuzzled and unrestricted to probe the Lucien Rivard affair and that conspiracy charges be laid against several persons. He declined to name those against whom charges should be laid, saying it was up to Chief Justice Frederic Dorian to do so in the report of his judicial inquiry into allegations of attempted bribery and coercion against four aides to federal cabinet ministers. Mr. Drouin in a three-hour address to the Dorian inquiry accused Justice Minister Favreau of straight-jacketing the RCMP investigation into the allegations last summer, of exceeding his authority as justice minister in deciding against laying charges and of departing from standard British parliamentary practice by not consulting his legal experts.

Reed Paper Buys Wall Paper Firm

LONDON (AP)—The Reed Paper Group announced Tuesday that it has won a seven-week battle for control of Wall Paper Manufacturers, Britain's biggest wallpaper company. Holders of more than half of Wall Paper equity have accepted Reed's offer of a share exchange at 13s 8d (\$2.05) each. This would place a value of £65,000,000 on Wall Paper. Originally, the take-over bid was made jointly by Reeds and Courtaulds, the textile group. But Courtaulds dropped out after Wall directors declared they would fight the takeover. The subsequent battle between the boards of Reed and Wall was one of the bitterest seen by London's financial district for some years.

Relief For Young Chaplin Is Opposed By British MPs

LONDON (AP)—Two members of the House of Commons said Tuesday relief payments to Charlie Chaplin's out-of-work son should be stopped. John Hunt and Peter Blaker, both Conservatives, asked about the size and reasons behind weekly government payments to actor Michael Chaplin, 18. With his wife, Patricia, and their infant son, Christian, young Chaplin is living in a crumbling London tenement on relief payments of £10 (\$30) a week.

"Like many other MPs," said Blaker, "I am sure that I have thousands of constituents who are in more difficult and deserving circumstances. People I know in the acting profession take jobs, such as waiters, between engagements. One would have thought Mr. Chaplin would do the same rather than rely on national assistance, which means the British taxpayer's money."

Blaker said he wants Pension Minister Margaret Herbyson to explain why payments are being made to young Chaplin. Hunt brought in a similar question.

Young Chaplin said he has another week in which to find a job and added: "When I went to the unemployment people three weeks ago I was given a month to get a job as an actor. Now I'll do anything, even dig holes in the road if necessary, although I'd

still like a job in the theatre." "I haven't had a permanent job since I left the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art last December. I don't think £10 a week is too much to give me." Michael and his wife married in February. Chaplin's father and mother are on a visit to London. They have not seen Michael, but Mrs. Chaplin criticized her son for living on relief. The elder Chaplins live in Switzerland.

Senator Urges U.S. Get Out Of S. Viet Nam

VANCOUVER (CP) — Senator Ernest Gruening (Dem. Alaska) said Tuesday the United States should pull out of South Viet Nam because it has no business being there and cannot win the war. "All of Viet Nam is not worth the life of a single American boy," he told a convention of cheering longshoremen from California, Oregon, Washington,

Utah, Hawaii and British Columbia. "If we would wage peace as vigorously as we are now waging the war in South Viet Nam we would not be in the mess that we're in." Describing the Vietnamese situation as "a civil war," he told the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union (Ind.) he was "in total disagreement" with the policy of President Johnson in Southeast Asia. Although there had been some infiltration into South Viet Nam of Communist Viet Cong guerrillas from the north, the United

agreements and the United Nations charter by setting up "puppet governments" in Saigon and by refusing to permit over-all Vietnamese elections to reunify the country. Sen. Gruening said President Johnson should order immediate withdrawal of all American troops from South Viet Nam and let the Vietnamese decide who will run their country. The U.S. didn't even have the support of its Southeast Asia Treaty Organization partners for its actions in the area.

Forest Products Research Urged

WINNIPEG (CP)—An appeal for a greater effort in forest products research both by industry and the federal government was made Tuesday by R. F. DeGrace of Ottawa, executive director of the Canadian Wood Development Council. Much less is being spent on this type of research than on research in agriculture, mining and fishing, he said in an address to the Canadian Institute of Timber Construction. There is no dearth of problems in forest products research, Mr. DeGrace said. Forty-eight new problems would be considered at this month's meeting of the advisory committee of industry to the forest products research branch of the federal forestry department. Yet, of the 83 problems similarly aired last year, there had been material progress on relatively few and many could not even be tackled. "It is high time we, as an industry, acknowledge our responsibility both to conduct an aggressive program of industry research, and to speak out insistently in favor of an adequate and effective forest products research program by the federal government."
