The Dartmouth apprentice painter played evenly with Crowell, 27-year-old Nova Scotia champion, in the morning round but drew ahead in the afternoon.

Kas Zabowski, Halifax, won the professional crown, followed closely by Pete Shyko, Truro, N.S.

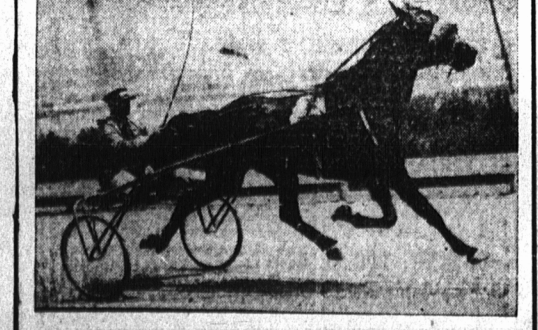
# American League Umpire Suspended

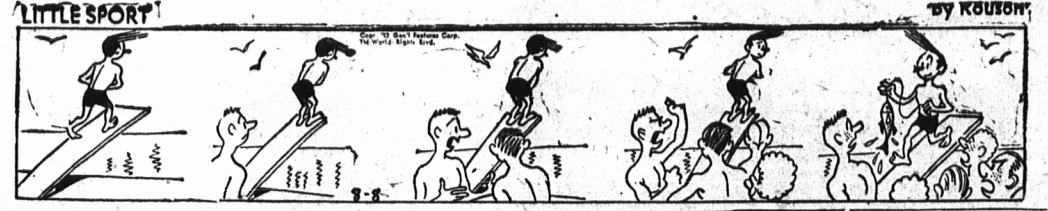

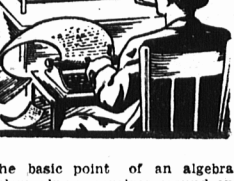

# Canada Pins Hope On Rochon And Main In Davis Cup Events Today

MONTREAL, Aug. 7 — (CP) — Canada is pinning her hopes on Henri Rochon and Lorne Main in the opening matches tomorrow of the final-round North American zone Davis Cup tennis tie against the United States.

Canada last week defeated Mexico 5-0, and the U.S. downed Japan and Cuba by similar scores.

Rochon takes on Herb Flam, ranked No. 2 in the U.S., in the first singles match, and three-time Davis Cupper Main takes on play-captain Vic Seixas in the second.

The selection today of veteran Rochon as a starter in place of Brendan Macken, who started against the Mexicans last week, came as a surprise.

Dr. Georges Leclerc, Canadian non-playing captain, explained: "Macken is our best player, but I chose Henri for tactical reasons. Macken plays 'the big game'—big serve, big round strokes and big net rusher.

"But, many American players, including Seixas and Flam, play the same game and have the answer to it.

"We are out to take as many games and sets as we possibly can, and I think the answer is to use the most unorthodox players we have."

"Rochon and Main are unorthodox. Henri has an undercut slice to the corners and is a left-hander. Lorne uses both hands or one hand, whichever suits the shot, and puts a heavy topspin on his strokes. They are both a puzzle to anyone coming up against them for the first time."

Canada has met the United States eight times and has won only one match—when Marcel Villeneuve beat Sidney Wood in 1931.

Dr. Leclerc said Macken is definitely scheduled to play in the doubles Saturday, but his partner has not yet been chosen.

Rochon said he was happy at the prospect of meeting Flam.

"Flam plays a steady, accurate game, but lacks the power of Seixas. I think if I play my game I can do well against him."

Vancouver's Lorne Main was just as happy, at the thought of meeting Seixas.

"Seixas is a net rusher and a volleyer and I play my best game against that kind of opposition," he said.

Winner of the Canada-United States final takes on Italy, European zone finalist, for the right to challenge Australia.

# Sharp Note Winner Of Hambletonian; Driver Is Oldest On Record

GOSHEN, N. Y., Aug. 7 — (AP) — Sharp Note, a \$1,000 bargain colt, was driven to a smashing victory in the \$87,637.55 Hambletonian stake today by a 74-year-old veteran of the Spanish American War.

Bl Shively became the oldest man to drive a Hambletonian victor. He took the second and third heats of the famous trotting derby for C.W. Clark of Dearborn, Mich.

The winner, a bay three-year-old son of Phonograph-Rosemary Hanover by Guy McKinney, beat 15 of the best sophomore trotters in the world, including Duke of Lullwater, the 1951 two-year-old champion and favorite to win this event.

Duke of Lullwater, owned by Walter Candler of Decatur, Ga., took only third-place money as the Goshen mix continued to hang over him. He has never won a race here.

Hit Song, owned by L.B. Sheppard of Hanover, Pa., and the Arden Homestead Stable of E.R. Harriman and E.T. Gerry, won the opening heat, with the Duke second. Sharp Note broke stride in that heat and finished 10th. But he was the boss from then on.

In the overall finish, Hit Song was second.

This is the first time since 1947 that the Hambletonian has gone three heats. That year Shively drove Rodney to victory in the opening heat, but Hook Men won the next two and set the race record of 2:30 flat. Shively also drove Lester Hanover in the 1945 race, but was out of the money.

Clark, who went on the track to get the cup for the 27th Hambletonian, has been in the sport only six years. He paid \$1,000 for Sharp Note as a yearling.

Clark collected \$47,236.64 for the victory.

"I guess it's not my greatest thrill to win," said Shively, "because I'm getting too old. If it had happened 40 years ago, I would have liked it better. But, don't tell anyone I'm not interested in the money."

# Sharp Note Winner Of Hambletonian; Driver Is Oldest On Record

Sharp Note was clocked at 2:30 3/5 for the second heat, as Duke of Lullwater nosed out Hit Song for place. Scotch Victor set the early pace, but Sharp Note took charge in the stretch and won by more than a length.

In the third heat, Sharp Note defeated Hit Song by about two lengths, with Duke of Lullwater third. Time for the deciding dash was 2:03 2/5. Lu Peck, a filly owned by O.L. Mears of Toledo, Ohio, set the early pace, but when Shively turned Sharp Note loose, the filly was up.

Hit Song paid \$7.90, \$3.40 and \$3.20 in the opening heat, while Sharp Note returned \$15.60, \$7.14 and \$3.80 in the second dash. The crowd then made Sharp Note the choice for the third heat; and the Clark colt justified their faith by coming in with a \$3.90, \$3.30 and \$2.80 payoff.

Sharp note had been sharpened for this race for weeks right here in Goshen. Shively never raced the colt since May at Santa Anita Park in California, where the colt won the \$10,500 Western Trot. His time was 2:02 4/5, fastest mile ever turned in by a three-year-old trotter that early in the season. He had won his only other start at Santa Anita this year.

Last season he started 11 times and had four wins, two seconds. His total winnings until today were but \$14,511.

Joe O'Brien of Alberton, P.E.I., driving Scotch Victor, finished third in the first heat and placed fifth in the second and third. Scotch Victor won a purse of \$5,153.00. Clint Hodgins of Clandeboye, Ont., driving Dallas Hanover, placed sixth, 14th and 11th.

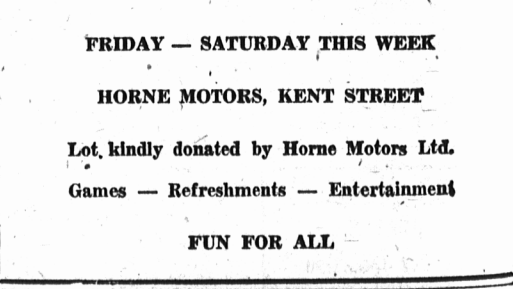
