Large Crowd Enjoys Fiddling, Step Dances

An estimated 500 "old time" music enthusiasts turned out at Prince County Vocational School last night for the Summeride Boys Club's first annual old time fiddling and step dancing contest. Contestants from across Prince County were entered in the four events on the program.

Summeride's Toussaint Arsenault, last year's provincial champion fiddler, emerged winner in the fiddling contest with Preston Mackinnon of Coleman emerging second and Eddie Arsenault of St. Chrysostome third.

In the step-dancing competition for boys and girls 15 and under young Paul Smith of Colebrook took top honors. Second place winner was Helen Arsenault, Egmont Bay. A regular favorite in these competitions, Marcelle Gallant, Egmont Bay, emerged first in the ladies 16 and over class. Mona Arsenault, Summeride was second choice with third place and Benjamin J. Arsenault, Egmont Bay.

The final event of the evening, the men 16 and over class, saw Leonard Derogé of Mt. Carmel finishing first, Harry Harvey of Emmore captured second place and Benjamin J. Perry of St. Louis took the final spot.

Left Swing Is Expected In U.K. Vote

LONDON (Reuters)—The Opposition Labor party appeared confident Wednesday Britain's municipal government would take a fresh leftward swing to day in voting for nearly 400 city and town councils throughout England and Wales.

These contests—which include first time contests in 14 enlarged individual boroughs of the giant new Greater London Council—will provide the British general election's first general election vote.

They will provide the last county-wide test of political opinion before the British general election—expected in the first half of October.

Though local government voting is not regarded as a safe indication of how the country will vote in a general election, it can nevertheless provide valuable indication of trends.

In this week's local government voting—which up to now has included the British general election district councils in England and Wales and town councils in Scotland—the Conservative party so far claimed a net gain of 86 seats in England and Wales and 16 in Scotland.

Cuban Policy Is Effective

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson said Wednesday the U.S. policy of economic isolation of Cuba "is being effective" and the "United States will insist and urge that its allies join in supporting the action against the Castro government."

On another question relating to Cuba, Johnson said he was "not familiar" with any agreement with Russia covering Russian approval of U.S. reconnaissance flights over Cuba.

Soviet Premier Khrushchev said in a speech recently that no such agreement existed. Johnson was told at his press conference some U.S. officials said there was Soviet agreement to the flights.

When the issue of economic boycotts of Cuba was raised, Johnson was asked whether he thought denial of goods to the Castro regime could be effective unless U.S. allies co-operated.

Revised S'side Park Plans Available In Two Months

A decision is expected to be made known within two months on a revised proposal by the Summeride and Rural Planning Commission for the construction of a proposed new industrial park in the P.O. Road-Green Road area. It was learned last night at a regular meeting of the Summeride Board of Trade, strong support for the industrial park to be located in the area.

The original plan called for a 400 acre area to be used. However, in the revised submission, this has been cut to 35 acres.

Earl Cannon, president of the board said last night the cost of servicing the area has been reduced, its growth as an industrial park. This proposal would provide for services in the area.

The revised project will cost in the vicinity of \$150,000. The meeting was told that the construction of roads in the park has been virtually assured by Highways Minister, Philip Mulholland, and this would reduce the cost by approximately \$50,000.

The commission hopes to receive the remaining \$100,000 from the Atlantic Development Board.

The new plan is giving as virtuous for the same thing as we asked for in the first place," Mr. Cannon stated. "With the aid of services and paving of roads in the general area, there would be little problem if a firm was to locate some where other than the industrial park area. This would reduce the cost by as much as the services will then be provided."

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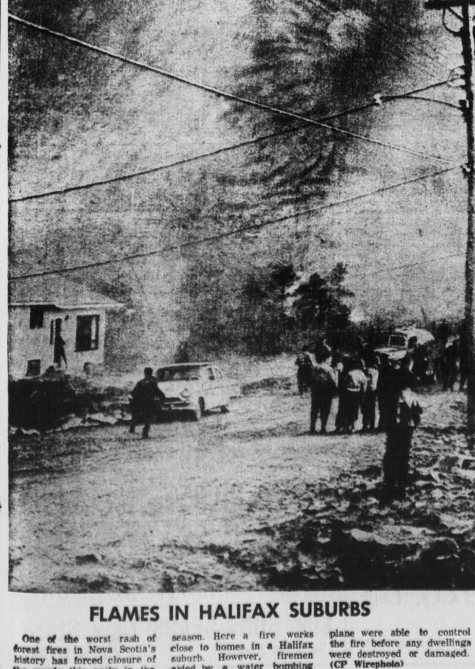
