Accused Pleads Guilty To Six Theft Charges

GEORGETOWN — A considerable number of cases were before Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, here yesterday. The Crown was represented in all cases by Deputy Attorney-General J. Arthur McGuigan, QC.

A number of accused were unable to present in court due to blocked roads, and had their cases adjourned for one week to Souris. Others through arrangements made with Clifford Wilfred Larkin, of Armadale, RR, elected trial by magistrate and pleaded guilty to five charges of break, entry and theft, and to a charge of the theft of an automobile from S.E. QCHS Red Cross Has First All-Boys' Home Care Course

Queen Charlotte High School Red Cross, which this year has Norman MacLeod as its teacher-sponsor, established a "first" for the province and perhaps for the Maritimes, yesterday when 10 boys had their first lesson in home care from the Red Cross "Teen Manual".

This manual has been prepared by the Canadian Red Cross Society to help boys, as well as girls, prepare themselves to assume a measure of responsibility for the better welfare of their own families, and of the community at large.

While there are a few boys enrolled at Summerside High School, the class at Queen Charlotte is composed entirely of boys.

Mrs. W.W. Reid, director of junior Red Cross for the province, said last night that she is hopeful that other schools will follow the example set by Queen Charlotte, and added that she had been given to understand that the boys at Montserrat high school also had a project of this kind in mind.

Dr. Paul Cadmore gave the introductory lesson of the Queen Charlotte course which will be carried on by Mrs. James Murphy, RN, who will be assisted by her husband, Constable Murray of the RCMP.

Easter Beef Show, Sale Is Opening Here Today

Final preparations were made yesterday for the annual P.E.I. Easter Beef Show and Sale which opens at the Coliseum, Exhibition Grounds, today and continues through tomorrow.

A record entry of 140 animals has been received for the two-day event. The weighing-in of animals took place yesterday at Canada Packers. This morning at 9 o'clock steers will be weighed, and judging will get underway at 1 p.m.

The animals will be divided into two categories for judging: 4H club entries with 18 a and general entries 88. These in turn will be divided into various classes by breed and weight.

An additional entry for judging this year will be the "groups of three". The three animals will show as a single unit and will be sold as a single unit.

A new project undertaken by the association this year is the Breeder's sale to be held at 10:30 Friday morning. Twenty-one units will be sold.

Four Herefords, six Aberdeens, Angus, and 11 Shorthorns. Auctioneer will be Claude Craswell of Windsor. The beef stock sale will be held Friday starting at 1 p.m.

The association will hold an "Easter Beer Banquet" at the North River Hall tonight at 7:30.

TO PROFESSIONAL THEATRE Efforts Of Small Towns Are Seen As Important

Artistic endeavors such as the regional drama festival in Montague are of great importance to professional theatre in Canada because it had little support from many of the smaller communities where the theatre so often finds its talent.

This is the opinion of Walter Massey, actor, director and lecturer of Toronto, who arrived in Charlottetown yesterday from Halifax to adjudicate the festival being held in the Montague Regional High School, March 12, 13 and 14.

Mr. Massey, in mentioning some of the well-known theatres such as Stratford, the Neptune theatre and the Manitoba Civic Centre, added that they need support culturally in communities across Canada. He emphasized that this support can only be provided by the communities themselves.

He explained "We can only try to help a community by bringing itself up to a standard by its own limitations. We do not tell it what to do but only take what it does to see if it has been able to reach those limits."

He noted that the festivals are of a constructive rather than a competitive nature. That the actors enjoy themselves and that the audience enjoys itself is the most important principle of theatre, Mr. Massey feels.
