PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE
Opening of the Session This Afternoon.

THE LIEUT.-GOVERNOR'S SPEECH
The Guard of Honor—A Large Attendance of Citizens.

The Provincial Legislature met for the despatch of business this afternoon, the opening ceremonies beginning at three o'clock. There was a large attendance of ladies and gentlemen, and much interest was taken in the proceedings.

The speech with which His Honor Lieutenant-Governor McIntyre was pleased to open the session reads as follows:—

SPEECH
Of His Honor Peter Adolphus McIntyre, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Prince Edward Island, on opening the third session of the thirty-third General Assembly, on Tuesday, the 8th day of May, 1900.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:
In meeting you for the first time in my official capacity, I am pleased to be able to congratulate you upon the prosperous year which we have enjoyed since the last session of the Legislature. For this, as well as for the present healthy condition of trade in this Province, we should be profoundly thankful.

Towards the close of last year, the South African Republic declared war against Great Britain and the followers of President Kruger having invaded British territory, the Empire was forced to take up arms in defence of its people. As the Queen's representative of this Province, I congratulate you on the proud position occupied to-day by Canada, and on the enthusiasm displayed in Prince Edward Island when called upon to give of her best men to fight for Queen and country. No more striking proof could have been afforded of the true loyalty which characterizes our people. The name of Canada has been immortalized on the battle-fields of South Africa, but we deeply deplore that so many of our young men have had to surrender their lives. The speedy termination of the war and the safe return of the Canadian Contingents are to be devoutly prayed for.

The hearty manner in which our people responded to the request for contributions to the Patriotic Fund is another proof of their devotion and patriotism, and calls for our united thanks.

The legislation of last session providing for the bridging of the Hillsborough River has been consummated by the completion of an agreement between my Government and that of the Dominion. The construction of this bridge, together with the building of the railway from Southport to Murray Harbor, works of great magnitude and importance to this province, is now assured and will be proceeded with immediately. In the negotiations which have taken place, I am pleased to be able to say that the Federal Government has dealt most fairly with this province.

The rapid growth of the Cheese and

Butter Industry in Prince Edward Island, combined with the quality of the articles produced and the prices obtained last year, is a subject of great satisfaction. Advanced methods in Agriculture have stimulated our husbandmen to greater efforts, and this Province is destined to become a model farming district. The Fruit Industry has also increased in importance as the exports from our orchards during the past season clearly demonstrate. This is a coming source of wealth, which I trust will be taken advantage of by our fruit growers and farmers.

Believing that properly conducted Agricultural Exhibitions are most beneficial, my Government has provided that one general exhibition, open to the other Provinces, shall be held in Prince Edward Island during the coming autumn. I feel safe in saying that this will be much appreciated by the great majority of our people.

In order to furnish the increased accommodation so urgently needed at the Falconwood Hospital for the Insane, my Government has entered into a contract for an extension or annex to the building, and you will be asked to provide ways and means for that purpose. Several important reforms with modern ideas have lately been introduced into the everyday work of the Asylum, which will, I believe, meet with your unqualified approval. Since you last met, Commissioners were appointed to investigate the management of that Institution, and their report will be laid before you.

During the recess, a delegation from my Government visited Ottawa to press upon the Dominion the claims of this province. The investigation of these matters has fully convinced all concerned that our demands are just and must of necessity be recognized.

The desirability of a school for the promotion and advancement of agriculture, horticulture and the mechanical arts, led to a conference between representatives of the Governments of the Lower Provinces during the past autumn, with a view of joint action being taken. It is most essential that our young men, instead of going abroad to enrich other countries by their labor, should be encouraged to remain at home, and facilities afforded them for acquiring a knowledge of scientific farming, and securing other practical training, which would help to build up their native land.

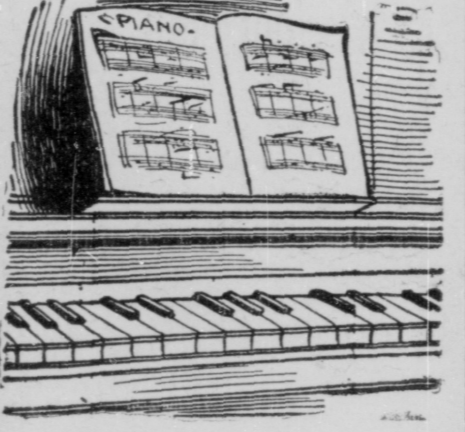
The past winter was such as to damage to a remarkable extent the Roads and Bridges of this Province. No other department of the public service demands such care and consideration as our public highways. Your attention therefore will be directed towards the introduction of such a system as will meet the public requirements, and at the same time be consistent with our revenue.

The erection of the new Prince of Wales College, a commodious and very substantial structure, marks an era in the history of education in this province. This building is but another link in our great educational system, and will be a source of pride to the present as well as to future generations.

The Public Accounts for the past year and the Estimates for the current year will be submitted to you.

I now leave you to the discharge of your important duties, believing that your deliberations will, under Divine guidance, be productive of great good to our people and Province.

The Guard of Honor was under command of Captain Allen, of No. 6 Company, 82nd Battalion, and consisted of one hundred men drawn from the 82nd Battalion and the Engineer Company. The band of the 82nd Battalion furnished the music.
The salute from Fort Edward was fired by a detachment of artillery from No. 2 Company, under command of Lieutenant Peak.
The St. John Sun says that, Rev. J. J. Teasdale, who was compelled to give up his work at Charlottetown, expects, after a short rest at Digby, to resume work.
Rev. T. F. West, Anglican rector of Ship Harbor, Halifax, proposes giving up his charge there. He finds the work of the parish too heavy and the damp climate hurtful.—Halifax Herald.
