IMPASSABLE BRIDGES.

Notes from Sturgeon Road, Lot 61

The farmers here are through digging. The potato crop is much below the average. So is the oat crop, and wheat, as is the case all over the Province, is nearly a total failure.

What with poor crops and bad roads, the farmers are having an anxious time of it. The price of pork is low, and only for the "milk receipts" the farmers would be ruined.

The Bruce and McLaughlin bridges are in an impassable condition. They are both on the Sturgeon Road, and the McGowan bridge on the Commercial Road is also dangerous. These three bridges are within a mile of one another, and what, between the Supervisor and our representative, Mr. D. A. McKinnon, we are in a bad way.

Mr. McKinnon, has plenty time to attend to such questions as the fishery award, and smut in oats, both above his ken. But he has no time to look after the wants of his constituency. There is a rumor here that he is to leave local politics and enter Dominion politics, so he may be above looking after small affairs like roads and bridges. But he had better be careful, there is a saying, "that he that is unfaithful in little is also unfaithful in much." POISON IN A PALACE.

How the Korean Emperor Punished His Would-be Murderers.

TACOMA, Wash., Oct. 19.—Detailed reports of the attempt to poison the royal family of Korea have arrived by the North Pacific mail steamer Tacoma. When the discovery was made the Emperor became very angry, and ordered his eunuchs and household attendants to drink of the poisoned coffee. They were taken violently sick, and the Crown Prince, who partook of the poisoned coffee without taking any food, narrowly escaped death. The ladies of the household were among those ordered by the Emperor to drink the poison. All of the thirty-six Imperial cooks and hangers-on in the royal kitchen were arrested pending a chemical analysis of the coffee, but none have been condemned to death.

The Emperor now places more confidence in Americans than in other nationalities. Ten Americans will be given places of honor in his new body-guard, Russia will be given two members, Germany and France five each, and England eight.

Local and Other Items.

NAVAL.—Her Majesty's ship Talbot is expected in Charlottetown next week.

DONATION.—Mrs Hobkirk and Mrs J Warburton have received ten dollars from "A Friend," Alberton, for the children's offering to the new P. E Island Jubilee Hospital.

FROM HALIFAX.—The steamer City of Ghent arrived about two o'clock this morning, and left on return about eleven this forenoon. She had a general cargo both ways.

SIGN OF THE TIMES.—A 60-horse power engine will shortly be installed in Mark Wright & Co's furniture factory. This means a largely increased output of furniture in the near future.

SHIPPED FROM SUMMERSIDE.—The Guardian's Summerside correspondents say: Mr S H Jones shipped 430 lambs to Point du Chene yesterday morning preparatory to being forwarded to Boston. He will ship 1,700 to-morrow and Monday. He also contemplates shipping a cargo of turkeys to Boston as an experiment.

ADVERTISING THE PROVINCES.—"Among the pictures being exhibited at Keith's theatre this week," writes a Boston correspondent, "are 'King Square, St. John; Digby Gap, Port Maitland and Moore's Falls (near Kentville), Nova Scotia, and a fishing scene on the line of the C P R. Mr. Keith's press agent, Mr M J Keating, who pays special attention to this part of the weekly entertainment, evidently takes every opportunity to advertise the provinces."

I. O. G. T.—Charlottetown Lodge was favored last night by a stirring address from Lodge Deputy, brother W J Kirby, on the plebiscite question. Brother Sabine also spoke to the point along the same line. The election of officers will take place next Thursday evening, and classes in a few subjects will be organized for the season previous to the meeting. The fall winter's programme will be opened early in November. It will consist chiefly of lectures and entertainments, held alternately each week.

A SPLENDID SERVICE.—Under this caption there is a lengthy article in the New York Marine Journal, in the course of which many nice things are said regarding the steamer Halifax and her staff of officers. It is said that during her ten years of service the Halifax has never met with an accident nor had a claim for a pound of freight damaged, a fact which indicates that she is one of the best managed and most successful steamers afloat. The Halifax is very popular with travelers, and during the tourist season especially her stateroom accommodation is always booked well in advance. Her officers, from Captain Pye down down, are all men of the right stamp, and every detail is carefully attended to. Those who go by the Halifax once always want to use her as a means of conveyance.

A CHANGE WANTED.—A largely attended meeting was held at Summerside yesterday afternoon for the purpose of petitioning the Federal Government for a change in the lobster fishing season to apply to the portion of the Island shore extending from Carleton Head to West Point. The meeting was addressed by Messrs W A Learl, E Bell, of Cape Traverse; Gilbert DesRoches, Misouche; Pascal Gallant, D Rogers, Summerside; Joseph J Gallant, Cape Egmont; Alexander Clements, Egmont Bay, after which a resolution was adopted declaring that the present season from May 1st to July 15th is not the natural or most remunerative one for that portion of the Island shore extending from Carleton Head to West Point and urging that the Government be asked to establish a separate fishing season for that portion of the coast—such season to commence May 20th and end August 15th—promising that in the event of such grant being made "this meeting and every packer and fisherman composing it gives an assurance to the government to aid and assist to the utmost of their power in the enforcement of all fishery regulations applicable to such season."

The Department of Agriculture at Ottawa is advised that Canadian tender fruits are arriving in England in splendid condition.

It is likely that a large pulp mill will be established at St John.
