**FORD TO BUILD A GLASS FACTORY.**  
DETROIT, Mich., June 27.—A glass factory to make all the glass used in Ford automobiles is to be built at Flat Rocks, 23 miles southwest of Detroit, on Henry Ford's railroad, the Toledo & Ironton. It was learned today that the site has already been obtained, and plans are now being drawn for the factory.  
A small part of the company's glass is now being made at the River Rouge plant. It is planned to manufacture cement also at the Rouge plant, utilizing slag from the blast furnaces there. The plant, it is estimated, will cost one million dollars.

**IN MEMORIAM**  
THE LATE MALCOLM C. MACDONALD.  
The death occurred very suddenly in this city Thursday night, June 22nd, of Mr. Malcolm C. MacDonald, the well known purser who was agent this season for the S. S. Magdalene and the S. S. Gaspesia.  
Mr. MacDonald went to work Thursday morning at 7 o'clock, had his dinner and tea, and was apparently in his usual good health. After tea he went out, and was in Mr. Stephen Duffy's Store when he complained of feeling ill. Dr. Ledwell was called in and Mr. MacDonald was taken in an auto to the home of his daughter, Mrs. H. A. MacDonald, with whom he had been living. On entering the house he laid down on a couch, and fifteen minutes later passed away.  
The late Mr. MacDonald was about 58 years of age, and was a son of the late Mr. John MacDonald of Kilmuir. When quite a young man he entered the steamship service as purser on the "Eucra" running between Georgetown, Montserrat, Pictou and other ports, serving in her during the summer, and in the winter he was purser on the Stanley and Minto plying between Georgetown and Pictou, he and his family making their home in Georgetown. Before being appointed purser on these boats he was for a time sub-agent at Georgetown, when the late Hon. Malcolm MacDonald was agent. Mr. MacDonald subsequently removed with his family to Charlottetown, where he was purser on "The Princess" plying between this city and Pictou, and later on "The Northumberland" remaining on her until she was withdrawn from the route.  
Coming in contact with the travelling public he had a very wide acquaintance, and was not only a very efficient purser but made very many friends by his courtesy and geniality. He was a member of various organizations, including the Masons, the Orangemen and the Knights of Pythias, and was exceedingly popular with his fellow members. They and citizens in general will learn with deep sorrow of his death, when not far past the prime of manhood. His wife died about three years ago. He leaves to mourn one son Earl in Boston and two daughters, Mrs. H. A. MacDonougall and Mrs. Lloyd Carleton of Charlottetown.  
The following brothers and sisters also survive: Archibald MacDonald at Kilmuir; Daniel of Dawson City; John of Jamaica Plains; Hugh in Boston; Edward in Hawthorne, Mass.; Mrs. Alex. MacPherson, Heatherdale; Mr. Robert MacLean, Butte, Montana; Mrs. Margaret Stewart, Thomaston; Mrs. Mrs. Fred Bowman, Somerville, Mass. and Mrs. Catherine Seaver of Hawthorne, Mass.  
The funeral of the late Mr. Malcolm MacDonald took place Sunday afternoon from the residence of his son-in-law, H. A. MacDonougall at the People's Cemetery. Services were conducted by Rev. George C. Taylor, the pall bearers drawn from the Masons, the Knights of Pythias and the Orangemen who were represented in the large procession were James Murley, David Bethune, John A. McLaren, C. Leonard MacKay, Harry Williams and Murdock McLeod. At the grave services were conducted by officers of each of the above fraternal organizations. There were many beautiful floral tributes and a very large attendance at the funeral, including many from Mr. MacDonald's old home in the vicinity of Valleyfield and Montague.

changes, and laying down new trunk cables. Right Hon. F. G. Kellaway, postmaster-general, admitted that the country's total of 975,000 telephoning in use was disappointing and that steps should be taken to attract new renters, but he declined to proceed with the construction of automatic exchanges because the cost was prohibitive. Second reading was given the wireless telegraphy and signalling bill, which amends the Wireless Telegraphy Act of 1904. Mr. Kellaway in introducing the bill said some form of control was necessary to prevent chaos in broadcasting, such as prevailed in the United States.
