TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Irish Affairs.

LONDON, May 19.

In the House this evening Col. King Harman, Parliamentary Under Secretary for Ireland, replying to Wm. A. Macdonald, Parnellite, in reference to the remarkable increase in emigration from Ireland, said it should be attributed partly to the growing want of employment in Ireland, partly to the fear entertained by the masses that the new crimes act would enable the authorities to punish persons for past violations of law, and partly to the fact that numbers of the Irish people were forced to leave the country because of the disinclination to join secret societies.

Macdonald asked: "Isn't the increase of emigration from Ireland partly due to the introduction of the Crimes' Bill and the desire of the Irish people to escape tyranny? (Cries of hear, hear.)"

Speaker Peel called for order, saying this is a matter of opinion and not a proper subject question.

Mr. Labouchere moved to adjourn the debate for the purpose of enabling him to criticise the annexation of Zululand.

Sir H. Holland said a full opportunity would be given to discuss that matter when the Zulu estimates are brought up for debate.

Several radicals supported Labouchere's motion.

Mr. Smith moved closure which was carried, 278 to 156.

Labouchere's motion was rejected, 280 to 142.

O'Brien at Ottawa.

OTTAWA, May 19.

O'Brien's meeting here to-night was attended by about two thousand persons. The greater part of the audience were young persons, including a number of women. O'Brien was well received and frequently cheered. The crowd was in excellent humor. The chairman read the following telegram from Archbishop O'Brien of Halifax.

"I express sympathy with you as a Christian and as a Canadian humiliated at the vile blackguardism of Toronto's educated ruffians who under Mayor Howland are chiefly responsible."

O'Brien goes to Kingston to-morrow.

The Army Attacked.

ST. CATHERINE'S ORT., May 19.

The Salvation Army last night were attacked by a gang of rowdies who pelted them with all kinds of missiles. A female member was struck on the chest and seriously injured. Others received severe bruises and cuts.

A Bark Wrecked.

HALIFAX, May 19.

A despatch from Louisburg says a large Norwegian bark from Africa, bound for Sydney was wrecked near Balfour last night. The crew had a narrow escape with their lives. There was a heavy fog on at the time.

A Truckman Killed.

HALIFAX, May 19.

Martin Pettipas, a truckman, was pinned against a wall by his car to-day and instantly killed. His life was crushed out, but scarcely a mark was found on his body to indicate the cause of the fatality.

Secessionists.

LONDON, May 19.

Lord Hartington and seventy other Liberal-Unionists have seceded from the Eighty Club in consequence of the Club's approval of Gladstone's Irish policy.

A Steamer Disabled.

HALIFAX, May 19.

The steamer Hungarian from Glouce Bay for Montreal with coal, encountered heavy ice, had both bows stove in, and returned to North Sydney for repairs.

New French Cabinet.

PARIS, May 19.

M. Defreyne is forming a Cabinet and hopes to complete the task by Monday. His friends believe he will retain General Boulanger as Minister of War.
