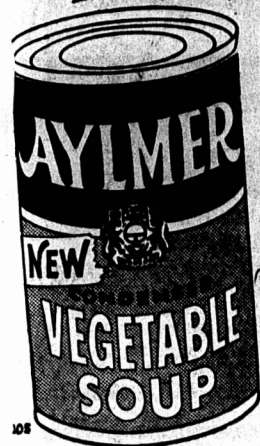

St. Patrick's Play Presented At Alberton

A St. Patrick's play was presented in the Women's Institute Hall at Alberton Friday evening by members of the Sacred Heart Church. The three act farce "For Pete's Sake!" was played before a full house.

Miss Sarah Pepperrine, a severe, dominating woman of 45, and proud of her ancestry, is about to leave on a trip to the Holy Land, as the play opens. Her nephew, Peter Pepperrine, who was to have accompanied her, is being left at home because of an unsatisfactory college record. Mrs. Clarkston wants her daughters to marry John Boliver, a wealthy broker, and Dupont Darby, the college tutor.

Mrs. Clarkston expresses a need for four servants when she comes to live in the Pepperrine mansion so Peter, in addition to his aunt's sarky cook, Jasmine Jackson, decides to provide her with himself as butler, Bill as gardener and Mugsy as housemaid. Their behavior, especially when John Boliver and Dupont Darby make love to Nadine and Peggy, is most entertaining. No sooner is the household thus established that Peter receives a telegram from his aunt saying she is homesick and afraid of the ocean and has cancelled her passage. The improvised ghost of Grandpa Pepperrine terrifies the Clarkstons into a hurried departure but in the confusion which precedes it Aunt Sarah arrives home.
